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MINUTES OF THE CONVENTION

Friday, May 6, 2005

The 221st Annual Convention of the Diocese of Maryland was held at the Clarion – Antietam Conference Center in Hagerstown, Maryland on May 6-7, 2005. Following new delegate orientation led by the Rev. Mark Gatza, the opening session of the Convention was called to order at 10:00 by the Right Reverend Robert W. Ihloff.

Carrie Brown, co-chairperson of the Theme Committee, welcomed the Convention members and gave an introductory presentation of the theme for this Convention –

Hearing the Voice of God – Walking Together in the Light of the Word

The Bishop called upon the Committee on Rights to Seats for a report of a quorum being present. After reading the numbers of certified lay and clergy delegates registered and present at the Convention, the Reverend Bill Smith and Lucy Claggett reported that a quorum was present.

Number of lay delegates registered and present – 121
Number of parishes, missions and separate congregations represented – 106
Number of clergy canonically resident in diocese – 297
Number of clergy registered and present - 114

It was the recommendation of the committee that of the congregations who have not paid their 2004 final assessment in full, in accordance with Canon 5-100, the lay delegates from:

Church of the Holy Cross, Baltimore
St. Mary's Church, Emmorton

not be granted their right to seat and vote at this Convention.

The Convention adopted this recommendation by voice vote.

It was also the report of the committee that fifty-eight congregations had failed to file their 2004 Parochial Report within the time specified by the Canons of this Diocese. Fifty-four of these congregations have since filed their reports along with satisfactory reasons for filing late. It was recommended that these fifty-four congregations be granted seat and vote. It was then reported that, as of this date, and in accordance with Article 2 of the Constitution, four congregations still have failed to file their 2004 Parochial Report.

It is the recommendation of the committee that the delegates, both clergy and lay from:

CONVENTION ADDRESS

It doesn't seem possible to me; this is my tenth Convention Address. It remains a high privilege to serve with you in Maryland where I see so many signs of the Holy Spirit's guidance and presence, where so many parishes are deepening and growing, and where so many of you are contributing actively to our health and life. A while back it occurred to me, I am one of the senior members of the House of Bishops (most other active bishops were elected in more recent years). I don't feel at all decrepit, but I do value the insights and contacts age and experience have afforded. I am delighted our Companion Diocese relationship with Accra and other international contacts enable me to have a finger on the pulse of our Communion, and being a member of the Theology Committee of our House of Bishops and President of Province III keep me actively involved in wider church issues. These things and more give me considerable hope and optimism about the future of our Church in Maryland, the Episcopal Church, and the Anglican Communion.

Yes, I am very optimistic about the health and future of the Anglican Communion. While there are strident voices calling us "broken" and extremely judgmental voices declaring one part or another of our Communion "apostate," in fact, we remain remarkably intact. I am not minimizing strain and hurt feelings—these exist, as they do in any relationship where cultures clash and difference is taken seriously. What amazes me is the extent to which most Anglicans around the globe remain committed to the basic tenets of our faith and honor the fact we will have different points of view, different theological perspectives, and different interpretations of Holy Scripture. Bound together by

the basic Creeds and Councils of the early Church, the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral, and a commitment to define our theology through liturgy especially evident in the Book of Common Prayer, we continue to honor our diversity and live into our unique understanding of the Reformation. At its bottom line, the special *charism* of our denomination is this respect for different theological perspectives being held together in Christ. He is our unity. We acknowledge we are neither like-minded nor uniform—Christ provides a unity our minds and wills cannot achieve. This embracing of difference and respect for diversity is the *charism*, the special spiritual gift, our Anglicanism manifests in every age. Its roots go deep into Celtic and Benedictine spiritualities, reflect the unique development of Christianity in the British Isles, and become operative in the “Elizabethan settlement,” in which old style Catholics and new-minded Protestants formed by the Grace of God one Church, Catholic and reformed. In more recent centuries, this openness to diversity has been tested and tried in cultures widely different from one another. The issues for dispute have changed, but the essential commitment to inclusion and basic faith in a divine unity expressed in diversity have remained intact. I believe with all my heart this is the work of God and a living miracle.

One of my favorite collects is that for Richard Hooker Day, November 3. It is a wonderful reminder of our Anglican *charism*: “O God of truth and peace, you raised up your servant Richard Hooker in a day of bitter controversy to defend with sound reasoning and great charity the catholic and reformed religion: Grant that we may maintain that middle way, not as a compromise for the sake of peace, but as a comprehension for the sake of truth.” We need as Anglicans to say to the more narrow-minded in our midst and to the world at large, the truth is not narrow but comprehensive! Truth is so comprehensive, no one of us knows it fully, so the best we can do is understand its parts and hope in community to construct a more complete sense of truth. We need to be clear that our maintenance of the “middle way” is not a compromise, but Godly inclusion; that is, it mirrors the comprehensive truth of God. This is a breath of fresh air desperately needed in a world where warring, petty and often shrill voices compete over “truths” unworthy of the name! As a denomination grounded in Scripture, rooted in tradition and valuing reason, we have a unique place in world dialogue and a voice needing to be heard. Let us not forget that this is not the first time in our history we have been engaged in “bitter controversy”; nor is our destiny in the hands of fallible men and women. This is God’s Church—what God wills will endure.

Some naively anticipate a “quick fix,” some universal Anglican agreement on the place of homosexual persons in committed relationships within our Church. Others forecast schism, an inevitable split between Anglicans who ordain gay and lesbian persons in committed relationships and bless their un-

ions and those who reject such practices. I anticipate a third option: an extension of our present reality in which we respect the integrity of member churches of the Communion to disagree. We have already been living into this reality for some time, and while dialogue needs to be encouraged, I do not see universal agreement happening any time soon. The *Windsor Report*, paragraphs 12-21, describe (if somewhat idealistically) how we have lived into serious disagreement over the ordination of women. Women priests, deacons, and bishops ordained in one part of the Communion are not recognized and cannot function in another, and so there is “a measure of impairment” (paragraph 21). What can we learn from this model? All parts of the Communion need to share local developments and the rationale for them more widely in the whole Communion. I am pleased that the American and Canadian Churches have prepared or are preparing theological rationales for their actions. I trust that other parts of our Communion, especially parts in which discussion of homosexuality has never taken place or where discussions are in their infancy, will read and prayerfully reflect on these theological and Scriptural statements. Some of our Anglican partners need to stretch to stand in our shoes, to become acquainted with debates which have been going on in the West in academia for fifty years and in our Church for over thirty years. For our part, we need to be patient to allow others to grapple for the first time with new materials and new ideas. Both sides will have to work hard and live into genuine dialogue. Over the next few years, I believe, we will not come to one mind, but will live into a new appreciation for the other and agree to respect our different interpretations of how Scripture informs our responses to gay and lesbian brothers and sisters.

Taking both the authority of Holy Scripture and its interpretation most seriously will be essential in all parts of our Communion if we are to grow in faith and remain united in Christ. I encourage all of you to read and read again paragraphs 52-62 of the *Windsor Report*. Scripture bears witness to the authority of God. “The purpose of scripture is not to supply true information, nor just to prescribe in matters of belief and conduct, nor merely act as a court of appeal, but to be part of the dynamic life of the Spirit.” (paragraph 55). The Scripture is so much more than the printed page. It requires a worshipping community in which to be read, discussed, and interpreted over time: “Questions of *interpretation* are rightly raised, not as an attempt to avoid or relativise scripture and its authority, but as a way of ensuring that it really is scripture that is being heard, not simply the echo of our own voice...or the memory of earlier Christian interpretations....” (paragraph 59) Scripture, like our relationship with Christ, is dynamic and not static. Over time passages of Scripture have been reinterpreted in very different ways. “When a fresh wave of scholarship generates ideas which are perceived as a threat to something the Church has always held dear, it is up to the scholars concerned, on the one

hand, to explain how what is now proposed not only accords with but actually enhances the central core of the Church's faith. And it is up to the Church, on the other hand, not to reject new proposals out of hand, but to listen carefully, to test everything, and to be prepared to change its mind if and when a convincing case is made." (paragraph 60)

Some here at home and abroad accuse Americans and Canadians of embracing secular culture. It is well to remember that the Church in every age has appropriated aspects of its culture in a valid attempt to communicate the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the times. Many of the most beloved aspects of our celebrations of Christmas were, in fact, pagan customs appropriated by Christian missionaries to communicate the faith in northern Europe. Today in our Companion Diocese of Accra, there are concerted efforts to "Africanize" the Church and to make the Gospel more acceptable (less European) to people in West Africa. We struggle to make the Gospel real in America and to let our culture inform our theological thinking. This is not so simple as "selling out to culture," it is our engagement in a time-honored method of living into God's authority and into the authority of Scripture.

A word about reconciliation. It distresses me greatly whenever I hear someone say that within our Church we have "irreconcilable differences." Our differences are not to be reconciled by your changing my mind or my changing yours. Nor is reconciliation something which takes place because I will to forgive you or you will to forgive me. Reconciliation is the work of Christ! Jesus Christ has already reconciled you and me to himself and to God. Reconciliation is a gift by grace which surpasses our meager understanding and has absolutely no dependence on our resolving our disagreements. We participate in the reconciling work of Christ when we get to the altar and remember we have offended a sister and brother, leave the altar and seek out that person to ask pardon. We participate in reconciliation when we "respect the dignity" of the other as a loved child of God despite our differences. To suggest we have "irreconcilable differences" is not only to be frightfully un-Anglican, it is to reject the power of Christ to transform us and others by his love.

Where does this leave us? I believe in the years ahead the spirit of Anglicanism, a spirit of dialogue and respect for difference, will triumph. We will become more sensitive to each other's perspectives and form deeper faith as a result of our dialogues and the leading of the Holy Spirit. We will continue to find our unity at the altar and through liturgy (as we currently do here in most of our parishes despite widely different beliefs relative to homosexuality). In this we will emerge as a Communion stronger in faith, more able in evangelism, uniquely equipped to proclaim the Good News in a multicultural and increasingly diverse world. I believe this is our call, and I believe God is equip-

ping Anglicans to extend God's Kingdom in exciting ways around the globe. I am committed that we do so here in Maryland. The danger is we may let the devil triumph instead! We may give in to party strife, exhaust ourselves on issues of sexuality rather than address the truly essential issues of Christian faith: communicating God's love in a broken world, learning to share our resources as God's stewards, truly "seeking and serving Christ" in our neighbor as we live into our Baptismal Covenant. We have great opportunity to extend Christ's Kingdom here in Maryland—so many are hungering for the things our Church does best. As Anglicans and Episcopalians, we are a Church for the present moment, a Church which has withstood the tests of time, and a Church for the future. I believe our future is especially bright if we can keep our sights on mission and keep from draining our energies on secondary concerns which always have an attraction and endanger our primary call. "The harvest is plentiful," and Our Lord beckons us into the vineyard. We go together, strengthened by one another and empowered by Christ.

Going Public

In the late 11th and early 12th centuries in the midst of major economic, social, political and religious change it was two preachers that were given much of the credit for the social, political and economic changes - most notably the increase of justice between classes. Neither preacher was an economist. Neither held office or had status. Both, in fact, were mendicant preachers – that is having nothing of their own. But their preaching transformed **both** people and society.

There is an old adage about preaching when we start to address matters economic, social or political – "Now, preacher, you have gone from preaching to meddling!" Neither of these preachers sought to do anything but proclaim the Gospel. They were Francis and Dominic. Many scholarly accounts of the economic and social changes of the time reflect the incredible influence of these preachers and their communities.

We live in times of great change and stress in matters economic, social, political and religious. Yet the church often has a hard time finding its public voice. In fact, we are usually highly individualistic in our approaches to faith. In addition, we *compartmentalize* – separating out our faith from our work, our views on world affairs and the ballot box. Or, when we do seek to speak publicly, we often, as Peter Berger notes, use public rhetoric, but with private virtues, and thus it does not ring true with many and is dismissed as our concern only.

There is always a fear when we speak of going public that we are going to try to drown out other faithful voices. Let me say that we are Marylanders. As

such we are heirs to a great tradition of religious tolerance and of the valuing of the variety of religious voices. This tradition is to be cherished and affirmed. For us to speak of a public voice is not a voice which seeks to drown out others. Rather I like to think like a choir making beautiful music; each of us singing our part and in the combined beauty of many voices comes meaningful music.

The public voice for the church, and in particular for those of us who are the Diocese of Maryland is not in developing a laundry list of issues and then seeking to influence the appropriate bodies. Rather it is to re-appropriate our faith such that we see in service to Christ Jesus that we are called to proclaim in word and deed how God wills God's people to live. For too long we have concentrated on the maintenance of our structures, satisfied our individual or parochial needs and participated in the compartmentalizing of our lives such that we could and did ignore the genuine crises around us.

We must claim the public dimension of the Gospel, for we are about a transformed world, one reconciled to God's will. Francis, specifically, said that the world is our cloister. For us the world is the place for our ministry and mission. I want to address in particular social justice. What does God ask us to do to have a society that is just?

Francis and Dominic preached repentance, and it was a call to a right relationship with God, with all people and with all creation. The prophet Amos is noteworthy because he prophesied against the violation of the social order. The penitential preachers of the 12th and 13th centuries are heirs to the prophets and point us towards our ministry to speak against the violation of the social order and for the restoration of things in accordance with God's creation. This is the work we call social justice and it cannot be done unless we see as Francis did that the world is our cloister. Ultimately to move from maintenance to mission is about the restoration of all things to God in Christ.

First this means our congregations must see their ministry as serving **all** in their communities. Let me share four examples among many. St. Luke's on Carey Street in West Baltimore has completed the work of study and is devising a mission statement. They are one of fifty-five houses of worship in their neighborhood, but it is a neighborhood where seventy percent of the people are not churched. Their work pointed out that persons struggling with addiction, persons who have been incarcerated and children at risk are **not** being fully served. These persons remain largely at risk and marginalized. Their ministry is in accord with Micah 6:8 is to be "the safe harbor." All Saints, Sunderland, is one of the 1692 churches, its elegant colonial worship space one of the oldest and most historic in our diocese. Yet one Sunday a month, in the parish hall, a special

seeker service is held for persons for whom traditional worship is not an option at this time. One of our oldest congregations doing a very new thing. In western Maryland, Lonaconing, a mining community with a decreasing population, would on paper seem unlikely for growth. However, with intentional focus on children and youth saw its Sunday school double. St. James, Mt. Airy, aware of the pain and risk to children in divided families where divorce and custody battles take their toll on the most vulnerable – children - established the “transfer station” as a safe place for children to be picked up and returned so they are not caught up in the tragedy of domestic strife. Social justice begins with asking “Who among God’s children is in pain, who is in need and who is left out?”

Social Justice is about being stewards. For all we have is from God. Francis and Dominic went out owning nothing because all they needed was from God. We need to recover a true sense of stewardship, which is to share generously from what God has given us. In the Acts of the Apostles in both Chapter 2 and Chapter 4 we see that the disciples saw all they had as being “held in common.” I believe one way we must learn to live into this is to see that all God’s people have what they need. I am pleased that our Health Care Task Force and Mission Strategy Task Force are combining efforts to make health care for all a priority. For this is about health and wholeness for all God’s people and not about possession. We have churches such as Guardian Angel and Holy Nativity in Baltimore that need the resources of others, from us, to serve the people in their communities. All resources must be shared generously if we are going to live justly as God demands and as Christ exemplifies.

Amos warns Israel as we are to be warned that God’s justice will not tolerate transgressions against God’s people, and that all worship done without justice does not delight God. Two examples here point to the necessity of the church showing the world what it is God expects of us all. The first is our commitment to anti-racism – to break down the barriers of prejudice, power and discrimination that exist and work for a society where all of God’s people can feast on the bounty of creation. We have an Anti-Racism Commission, changed from task force to commission, as a sign of our long-term commitment. We are working on anti-racism training, and our reparations task force is well along in both its education and its work for a solution that restores and repairs that which has been broken and separated. Later in the convention you will hear from the Safe Church Committee on steps we are taking to assure that all are safe in the care of the church. We do this because God demands it, and we do it because we must show the world that all children must be safe. As we work to protect the children in the church’s care, we must work to make safe places and communities for all God’s children everywhere.

For too long our understanding of the word vocation has been work **in** the church. When I asked a wonderful saint named Meg to be my senior warden, she told me she would have to pray about it. For being on the vestry was her third vocation. Her first vocation was a wife and mother. Her second vocation was as public school teacher. Her third vocation was for St. Anne's. She had her priorities clear. We must reclaim the word vocation, which is to be an instrument of God's purposes in **all** creation. For too long vocation has meant what I do in and with the church. Vocation is what we do in the world; in teaching, in business, in education, in our communities and within and among our families. Christian vocation is about being an instrument for God's greater purposes in the world. Frederick Beuchner stated it this way: "Vocation is when our passions meet the needs of the world." We cannot separate our work in the world from vocation.

Discipleship is the work of the church; it is the servant work to which Christ calls us. In as much as the most often repeated commandment from our Lord is "whosoever will be first of all must be last of all and servant of all" we must always be about servanthood with and among **all** of God's children. The church is in fact, always called to disinterested service. We do not do what we do for our own reasons, but because others are in need. The shift from maintenance to mission by necessity requires us to understand the true discipleship to which we are called – that of servanthood.

Francis and Dominic reflected servanthood by focusing on those most in need, those most at risk and those left out. The public focus of our ministry is the work of discipleship with both the people who are at risk and with the causes that create their situation. We must actively serve the poor and actively work to overcome the factors leading to poverty. For several years we have taken a strong stand against domestic violence. We have trained persons to minister to those who are victims. At the same time we must address the systemic causes of violence. The prophets, notably Micah, Amos, Hosea and Isaiah, state that we must always sound the trumpet when there is a violation against God's good order. We sound this trumpet both in service to those in need and against the causes which harm God's people.

Like Francis and Dominic, we are called to preach by our deeds in and among all people. Going public is seeing that we are called to mission and ministry to all God's people and to see our vocation and discipleship as service to Christ Jesus in and through all things within and beyond the church.

Bishop Ihloff continues:

I share the distress of many of you with the tendency of both media and the religious right to define morality as individual piety. Nothing can be clearer

from the Gospel accounts of Jesus and the wealth of prophetic witness in Hebrew Scripture than God demands moral behavior which must ultimately be seen in and through our response to our neighbor. Social justice is at the heart of the ministry of Jesus in the world as much today as when he healed in Galilee and taught in Jerusalem. Christian faith is a way of living, not just belief, never only a life of personal prayer. Moreover, Jesus seems clear in his many biblical dialogues with the Pharisees, personal purity and piety pale in significance with sharing our resources with the unfortunate, engaging in acts of kindness, sharing love in community, and working for justice in society. The sin of the Pharisees was their preoccupation with personal purity coupled with their pride and their failure to devote their energies to promote peace and establish justice. Jesus often lauds persons of lesser “purity” because they, at least, have grasped something of the social demands of religious faith. The tax collector, Zacchaeus, is a case in point. Puritanism is a reoccurring phenomenon, and it is currently in vogue (and not only among Christians but among Jews and Muslims as well). At its worst, Puritanism accounts for a great deal of the violence committed in the name of religion—we see this in Islamic fundamentalism and in a host of other extremes. Even at its best, Puritanism is only the beginning of religious faith and a prelude to practicing that faith in the public arena.

As a denomination, we have a proud history of understanding the essential corporate nature of Christian faith. From our very strong, if subtle, Benedictine roots, we have understood that Christians are necessarily practicing their religious faith in the community we call Church. There are no individual Christians separate from the community! We simply cannot be Christian on our own (just me and Jesus). Being in Christ means living in community and sharing worship in community (hence the prime importance of common prayer), and working in community for the extension of Christ’s Kingdom in the world. His kingdom always entails actively working for justice, sharing our resources, and working closely with our neighbors. Jesus reminds us that our neighbors are sometimes very far away. Tsunami relief has galvanized many people here in America as we collectively reach out to victims and their families on the other side of the world. Our healthiest churches have always put “outreach” at the top of the agenda for financial support and concerted effort. In fact, healthy “outreach” bespeaks a healthy community. One of the first signs of stagnation, loss of vision, and inward preoccupation in churches is the demise of “outreach” ministries.

I keep putting “outreach” in quotes for a reason. It is a bad term. “Outreach” is never just sharing with those outside the community of the faithful; it is an essential part in the spiritual health of the community. Perhaps we should be more honestly calling it justice ministry, since justice is at its heart. My vision

for this Diocese is that we will continue to devote ourselves to ministries of justice at home and throughout our world. This is why sharing of resources, working for compassionate public policy, and making our voices heard on the issues is so important. I am pleased that over the past ten years, many within our Diocese have witnessed to the centrality of justice to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Both your bishops are actively involved with Bishops Working for a Just Society. All of us need to be speaking out and living into priorities which bespeak our deep faith. Christians are to make a difference in our world, and the Incarnation of Jesus is ever a reminder that God sees no separation between the spiritual and material. We are specifically called to use our material gifts for the betterment of society and to become by grace and the Holy Spirit incarnations of God's love for the world. We do that more by living justly than in being holy. In fact, true holiness always manifests itself in social action as well as personal purity, which is why even secular society lives in awe of a Mother Teresa of Calcutta, a Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the most dynamic Christians in your congregation. We need to be living out our faith with renewed perseverance and pointed actions toward justice and seizing all the opportunities at hand to witness in the world to the love of God.

John and I continue to be most thankful for the love and support of our wives, Sharon and Nancy, of our excellent and caring staff, and so very many fine and dedicated clergy and laity in this Diocese. To serve here with you is challenge and blessing, hard work and joy, stretching and affirming. Maryland is a wonderful and healthy microcosm of the Kingdom of God, and John and I give thanks to God daily for it and for you all.

Upon returning from break, the Bishop called for the Report of the Resolutions Committee. Inez Haynie Dodson presented the following Resolution for decision of the Convention:

RESOLUTION 2005-1

Title: Resolutions from General Convention 2003

Submitted by: Maryland Deputies to the 2003 General Convention

RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 6-7, 2005, accept and affirm the following resolutions passed by the 2003 General Convention of our Church:

A135: Holy Habits

Resolved, That in recognition of the church's tradition of calling us to work, pray, and give for the spread of God's kingdom, all members of The Episcopal

Church be encouraged to develop a personal spiritual discipline that includes, at a minimum, the holy habits of tithing, daily personal prayer and study, Sabbath time, and weekly corporate worship; and be it further

Resolved, That the Bishops and Deputies of the 74th General Convention be given an opportunity to sign the following declaration:

As Christian stewards and leaders of The Episcopal Church, we affirm that we are tithing, or have adopted a plan to work toward tithing as a minimum standard for our giving; and that, if we are not already doing so, we are committed to give priority to corporate worship, personal daily prayer and study, and Sabbath time in our own lives; and we invite all members of The Episcopal Church to join us in these holy habits; and be it further

Resolved, That we commit ourselves to present this declaration to our diocesan conventions for adoption and signature, and in turn to the vestries and people of our parishes, missions, and university centers; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary publish a list of the General Convention signatories in the Journal of the 74th General Convention and provide the same to *Episcopal Life* for publication of the statement and the list of signatories.

D006: Supporting International Relief and Development

Resolved, That the 74th General Convention endorse and embrace the achievement of the United Nations' Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) that pledge to:

1. eradicate extreme poverty and hunger;
2. achieve universal primary education;
3. promote gender equality and empower women;
4. reduce child mortality;
5. improve maternal health;
6. combat HIV/AIDS, malaria, and other diseases;
7. ensure environmental stability; and
8. develop a global partnership for development; and be it further

Resolved, That the Convention, recognizing that funding for nutritional, education, health care, and development programs is essential to achieve not only the MDGs, but also for recognizing the dignity of all human beings, reaffirm the 73rd General Convention's Resolutions A001 and D033 challenging all dioceses and congregations to contribute 0.7% of their annual budgets to fund international development programs; and be it further

Resolved, That the appropriate offices and staff of the Episcopal Church Center, in cooperation with Episcopal Relief and Development, promote among dioceses

and congregations education about and participation in the 0.7% contribution for international development; and be it further

Resolved, That the Executive Council be directed to fulfill the 73rd General Convention's Resolution D033 requiring the Council to develop a process for an annual accounting of each diocese's progress toward living into the 0.7% contribution goal; and be it further

Resolved, That the Executive Council in cooperation with the Communications Office at the Episcopal Church Center publish annually the annual accounting of all dioceses' level of participation in the 0.7% contribution goal; and be it further

Resolved, That the Standing Commission on Anglican and International Peace with Justice present a full report to the 75th General Convention of the level of participation of all dioceses in the call to contribute 0.7% of their annual budgets to fund international development programs; and be it further

Resolved, That the United States government, as one of the 191 national signatories to the United Nations' Millennium Development Goals, be encouraged to provide appropriate leadership and resources toward international efforts to implement these and other internationally agreed development goals and that the Episcopal Office of Government Relations actively advocate that the United States government fulfill its commitment to funding international development aid at 0.7% of the U.S. Gross National Product (GNP); and be it further

Resolved, That all Episcopalians contact their elected representatives, urging them to support the United States government's fulfillment of its commitment to funding international development aid at 0.7% of the U.S. GNP.

A010: Continue Anti-Racism Mandate

Resolved, That The Episcopal Church reaffirm its historic commitment to eradicate racial injustice in the Church and in secular society, and that the Executive Council continue the anti-racism program with appropriate staffing and budget, as approved by the 73rd General Convention (A047) and recommend the National Dialogues on Anti-Racism methodology; and be it further

Resolved, That the emerging provincial network of anti-racism trainers be recognized as an important resource, and its utilization commended to the several provinces, dioceses, and affiliated organizations of the Church; and be it further

Resolved, That the 74th General Convention extend its appreciation to the organizers and participants of the anti-racism hearings and call upon the anti-

racism committee (Anti-Racism Advisory Committee of the Executive Council and the Office of Social Justice) to implement a program that responds to the issues raised at the hearings, as appropriate; and be it further

Resolved, That all persons seeking election or appointment to the several standing commissions, other committees of Executive Council, related boards and auxiliary organizations must have had anti-racism training as required by the 73rd General Convention (B049) or agree to have this training within a year of their appointment; and be it further

Resolved, That the Office of Peace and Justice be commended for its "Stop the Hate" Campaign, and be encouraged to develop similar programs that address the issues of racial profiling and other abuses of the criminal justice system that have emerged in this post 9/11 environment; and be it further

Resolved, That the Anti-Racism Committee of Executive Council be directed to prepare a report for the other standing committees and commissions of the Church that inform them of the several issues emerging from the anti-racism hearings, and specify what actions each might take to ameliorate the impact of racism in their area of concern.

A079: General Convention Deputies

Resolved, That the 74th General Convention recommend that diocesan conventions nominate candidates for deputations to General Convention that incorporate the next generations, and also the multilingual, multicultural character of our churches and communities, so that deputations reflect the vision we have for the church we are; and be it further

Resolved, That the 74th General Convention recommend that all dioceses and congregations engage this vision when presenting candidates for all representative boards, including, but not limited to, vestries, delegations to diocesan conventions, and Standing Committees.

A083: Articulate Faith Story

Resolved, That the 74th General Convention call every Episcopalian to be able to articulate his or her faith story; and urge dioceses and congregations to create opportunities for these stories to be told.

It was reported from the Committee on Resolutions that Resolution 2005-1 was moved with a recommendation to accept.

Following discussion, the resolution passed by voice vote of the Convention. It was reported that copies of the "Holy Habits" portion of the resolution would be available for delegates to sign.

The chairperson of the Committee on Resolutions next moved Resolution 2005-9 onto the floor for consideration. It was noted that the wording printed in the Pre-Convention Journal was not the final draft from the committee, and copies of the new wording were distributed amongst the delegates in their registration packages.

RESOLUTION 2005 – 9

Title: Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation

Submitted by: Compensation and Benefits Committee
Michael C. Warlow, Acting Chair

Be it RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Maryland continue its commitment to being a living wage institution and, therefore, any employee of any congregation have a wage of not less than \$9.10 per hour, and that health benefits be available to any employee working at least 20 hours per week, and

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that all clergy and lay employees be granted an annual review of performance that should consider merit increases in compensation as appropriate, and

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that the annual salary increase for clergy and lay employees for 2006 shall be the total of a 3% Cost of Living adjustment (COLA) on the 2005 salary plus any increase based on responsibilities and performance.

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention adopts the following Honoraria for supply clergy for 2006:

1 service	minimum of \$175.00
2 services	minimum of \$225.00
3 services	minimum of \$275.00
Guest Preacher	minimum of \$125.00

and further directs that travel expenses for supply clergy be reimbursed in compliance with the Internal Revenue Service Guidelines, and

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that this convention urges all congregations to provide fair, equitable, and competitive compensation to all persons providing

services such as, but not limited to, Director of Music, Choir Director, Director of Christian Education, and Director of Youth Programs. Information concerning appropriate compensation can be obtained from the diocesan office. Suggested salary ranges are available for the compensation of Church Organists and Choir Directors based on information from the American Guild of Organists and the Association of Anglican Musicians.

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that for transitional clergy the first year following their ordination, the minimum annual cash compensation, including salary and housing allowance, will be \$44,060.

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that the suggested range of Total Cash Compensation (TCC) for clergy who are Assistant Rectors or Associate Rectors is \$50,800 to \$56,100.

Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convention adopts the following TCC criteria for clergy in charge of congregations within the Diocese for the year 2006.

EXPLANATION

The components of Total Cash Compensation (TCC) and information on how to formulate an equitable housing allowance are outlined in the Diocese of Maryland Compensation and Benefits Guide, Attachments 2 and 3, which is available on the Diocesan web site or through the Diocesan office.

Diocesan Canon 4-140 calls upon the Convention to set minimum annual compensation payable to all parochial clergy, as well as provide for lay employees to receive fair and adequate compensation. This resolution sets forth the recommendations of the Compensation Review Committee in this regard.

Compensation of Musicians

It is recommended that appropriate compensation, to include salary and benefits, be offered to church organists and choir directors. Although suggested ranges are included below, the actual salary that a particular parish can offer will depend on many factors in addition to the qualification level of the musician, including the experience level of the musician and such things as the size of the church, setting (urban – rural), attendance at services, and budget. The scales included below are not binding on parishes of the Diocese. These recommendations should not impede the freedom of a talented parishioner from offering his or her services on a volunteer basis or the freedom of a parish or mission to accept such services.

The salary recommendations of the Association of Anglican Musicians (AAM), included along with appropriate certification level identified by the American Guild of Organists (AGO) in the following chart should be considered together with years of experience in developing compensation packages for organists and choir directors. Ranges shown below reflect salary suggestions appropriate for musicians with five to twenty years of experience. Salaries of those whose experience level is outside this range may be compensated differently. More detailed information may be found in the handbook *Musicians Called to Serve*, published by the AAM.

In addition to salary, the following benefits can be considered for musicians and organists:

- Health, Dental, Life Insurance
- Pension Plan
- Continuing Education Expenses
- Membership in professional organizations
- Sabbatical leave
- Reimbursement of job-related expenses (music purchase, postage, supplies)
- Auto expenses (job-related driving)
- Teaching facilities (permission to use church spaces and instruments for private lessons)

An adequate music budget will also enhance the musician's experience on the job.

Other fees

Substitute Musicians:

Church Service, Organist or Choir Director only	\$150 - 250
Church Service, Organist and Director	\$200 - 300
Additional Duplicate Services	add 50%
Additional Choir Rehearsal during the Week	\$75 per hour

Weddings: \$200 – \$300, additional if rehearsals are required.

Funerals: \$100 - \$200, depending on the difficulty of the music and participation of choirs, instrumentalists, etc.

Additional: It is suggested that education programs designed for young musicians be promulgated by the Diocese.

A motion was duly made, seconded and passed that the figures mentioned in the original Resolution concerning honoraria for supply clergy in 2006 be increased by \$50.00 in each category.

Convention then proceeded to cast a second ballot, following instructions from the Secretary of Convention.

Bishop Ihloff invited Suzanne Beyda and Andrea Parham to make a presentation of a United Thank Offering Grant to the Church of St. George's & St. Matthew's. Delegates were encourage to put donations in the blue boxes placed on the tables during Convention. Approximately \$7000.00 was collected from the Fall In Gathering at the Church of Ascension, Westminster. A total of \$560.00 was collected from the blue boxes at the end of Convention.

The next item on the agenda was a report from the Diocesan Treasurer, S. Stevens Sands.

TREASURERS REPORT

As your Treasurer, I am pleased to be here to review the highlights of 2004 with you. Our annual audit for 2004 will get underway this month and will again be conducted by McGladrey & Pullen, Certified Public Accountants, results of which will be delivered to the Diocesan Council in June of this year. Again, we expect to receive a clean audit opinion.

As to the Operating Income and Expenses, I am pleased to report that we finished the year with an operating surplus of \$28,309. Our 2004 Budget anticipated a surplus of \$0, (a true not for profit organization) so we finished the year \$28,309 ahead of our plan. Total Operating Income was \$3,471,434, of which Congregational Allocations were \$2,784,259 or 80%. In 2004, most congregations paid their allocations in full; however, allocation payments did finish under budget by \$46,501 due to write-offs.

Copies of the final Operating Income and Expense Statement may be obtained from the Diocesan Business Office.

\$489,560 or 14% of total income was from unrestricted and temporarily restricted investment income. Investment income is calculated at 5% of the three year moving average of the market value of our investments. This is a formula used by many non-profit organizations, universities and private secondary schools. Also included in this category is accumulated, restricted income drawn and used for specific and qualified purposes.

The Investment Committee of the Diocese meets quarterly to review the performance of the investment managers responsible for managing our portfolio, which was valued at \$22,813,976 on December 31, 2004.

The asset allocation for the Diocesan funds at year-end was 29% in fixed income and 71% in equities. With respect to the allocation of funds that are managed for certain parishes, fixed income amounted to 40% and equities 60%. The individual parishes participating in the investment program determine the percentage of diversity between funds.

Most importantly I would like to thank Carol Ketler for the many years she was such a loyal Comptroller for the Diocese. She has now moved on and I would like to warmly welcome Karen Stewart as our new Comptroller. She has extensive experience in both the not for profit and for profit business and is a wonderful addition. I encourage all to meet her today.

DIOCESAN COUNCIL REPORT

Bishops, Delegates, Visitors, Friends,

Thank you for giving me this opportunity. First, I would like to ask all members of Diocesan Council, continuing and outgoing, to stand and be recognized.

Acting as convention in recess, council has been working hard on your behalf. With the help of Program and budget, we passed another mission-driven, yet balanced budget. With the hard work of our treasurer and Financial Advisory Board, we are continuing to explore alternatives so that the long-promised dining and meeting facility at Claggett will become a reality, while minimizing the financial impact on other diocesan operations.

And we have taken seriously the mandate from last year's convention. We have instituted anti-racism dialogues at council meetings. We encourage congregations to do likewise. But the reason that we do this hard work is so that others can be free to BE the church. At the John Rutter mass at the Cathedral recently, we dedicated a children's memorial and prayed for all children who have died or will die from violence. If council can channel extra time, talent and treasure into preventing childhood violence, then council energy is well spent.

The appeals process is being redesigned, and that has raised the question of what it means to be a church family. What it means to put aside our differences and come together as the Body of Christ. It is odd that we have acrimonious discussions over dollars and cents, and I applaud all who have refused to allow money to interfere with being church.

As we move forward, council is committed to handling the business matters of the diocese as straightforwardly as possible, so that everyone else may be as free as possible to work for justice.

If you feel called to serve God through council, bless you. And if you feel called to serve God in other ways, in the city, in Appalachia, in any justice work, then bless you, too. Whatever you do, act on that call.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention encourages each parish and mission in the Diocese to provide for Youth representation on their Vestry or Mission Advisory Board.

EXPLANATION

The purpose of this resolution is to place The Diocese of Maryland in compliance with the 2020 commission rules outlined by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church of the United States in 2000 in Denver, Colorado.

This resolution will permit each parish to be inclusive of the Youth from The Diocese of Maryland. These changes in the Diocese of Maryland bylaws will permit a greater participation of youth in important parish events that at this time do not include the creativity and voice of the youth.

The Church has long regarded youth as the next generation of members. The reality is that the youth celebrate their religion at church and should therefore be included as equal members before God.

This resolution will enable youth to understand the inner workings and complexities of the Church and its daily operations. Youth will understand more acutely what is needed to effectively lead the operations of the Churches and organizations therein.

* * * * *

Several of our Youth Delegates present spoke and urged Convention to adopt this Resolution.

After discussion and several friendly amendments, the Resolution was voted upon and passed as printed.

With no other candidate receiving a majority, and a third ballot therefore necessary, in accordance with Rule of Order 19, the Rev. Anne Weatherholt, having received the fewest number of votes, was dropped from the ballot before moving to the third ballot.

Upon receiving instructions from the Secretary of Convention, the delegates proceeded to cast a third ballot.

Capital campaign co-chairs, the Rev. Florence Ledyard, the Rev. Bill Ticknor and Izzy Winn announced the end of the diocesan capital campaign, *Building on Faith for the Future*. The campaign raised \$2.5 million. In gratitude for the effort put forth by the co-chairs, Bishop Rabb presented each with a gift of appreciation.

The Rev. Betsy Van Auken addressed the Convention and shared an update on the work of Episcopal Relief and Development.

EPISCOPAL RELIEF & DEVELOPMENT REPORT

During the calendar year of 2004, the total giving from parishes and individuals to the Episcopal Relief and Development office was \$119,257.28. This was \$39, 435.00 more than our giving in 2003. There were 755 gifts from a total of 467 donors.

In response to the call to aid victims of the recent Tsunamis, more than \$100,000.00 has been given, but this is not reflected in the totals above, as most of it has been given in this calendar year of 2005.

* * * *

The next item on the agenda was a report on Prison Ministry, and the Bishop called upon Val Hymes to introduce the Rev. Jacqueline Means, Director of Prison Ministry for the National Church, who spoke to the Convention, and invited interested persons to meet with her during our fellowship hour this evening.

REPORT ON PRISON MINISTRIES

The Rev. Jacqueline A. Means, director of prison ministry for the national church, told the Convention it has the power to change cycles of violence and crime. "We know," she said, "if a child has one parent in prison, that child will have a 70 per cent chance of going to prison also, and if both parents are in prison, that increases to 90 per cent." There are about nine million children with parents in prison. There are 850 women in the state correctional institution. "Eighty-four percent of them are mothers." She added that 65 percent of the men in the prisons near the convention site are fathers.

The former prison chaplain came to the Diocesan Convention to suggest "an opportunity to start a new program that can break the cycle of incarceration for children who have parents in prison." Five dioceses have camps for inmates' children. Some are ecumenical, she added.

She said she hopes to establish two model programs in the nation – possibly one in inner city Baltimore – to demonstrate “how we can reach out to these young people who join gangs – to offer them a sense of belonging – an alternative to the violence, hatred, doom and destruction around them.” One of the answers would be a week of camp for those children, she said, because “One of the things we do well in the Episcopal Church is camp.”

There are 27,000 inmates in Maryland prisons. Hundreds are released daily. Today’s inmate becomes tomorrow’s neighbor. Some parishes are performing successful ministries. The Prison Ministry Task Force is preparing a directory of prison ministries for parishes.

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Upon returning from a Break, the next item on the agenda was the introduction of our Keynote Speaker. The Rev. P. Kingsley Smith, member of the Theme Committee, presented the Rev. Dr. Roger Ferlo. The Convention joined in the singing of “*Thou, whose Almighty Word*” and then Dr. Ferlo addressed the Convention body.

Following the Keynote Address and several announcements, the Convention recessed until the evening’s banquet and the Saturday session.

Following the Banquet, the St. James’ School Choir, under the direction of Barbara Wischmeier, entertained the Convention delegates and guests. The evening concluded with prayer led by the Bishop.

Saturday, May 7, 2005

RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland will encourage all parishes to celebrate and hold a Prison Ministry Sunday each year during the season of Epiphany;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland will encourage parishes to seek out and structure partnerships with people in prison and their families, those who work or volunteer in the prison system and help ex-offenders return to society in productive ways by working with and encouraging re-entry programs;

AND BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Secretary of Convention forward a copy of this resolution to the appropriate committee of our General Convention 2006.

EXPLANATION

Epiphany is the manifestation of the encounter with the Christ Child. It comes just before the darkness of Lent and people in prison live in darkness – in the

hallways as they walk to the chapel, the yard, the mess hall. We are ready to walk the way of the cross.

The Diocese of New York has successfully adopted this resolution put forward by the Rev. Charles Pridemore, Rector of Trinity, Ossining, and The Rev. Canon Petero Sabune, Chaplain at Sing Sing. Said Canon Sabune, "Prison Ministry is hard work, but it is transformational. Or to put it another way, "The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light."

They envision special services during Epiphany with former inmates reading and preaching in one or two parishes and prison ministers or former inmates speaking at coffee hours about opportunities in prison ministry, e.g., supporting prison chaplains with *Forward Day by Day* and other materials.

The Prison Ministry Task Force plans to provide parishes with materials listing various ministries already at work in the diocese inside and outside prison walls with contact names and addresses.

After discussion and the acceptance of a friendly amendment, the Resolution was voted upon and passed as printed.

EXPLANATION

Stewardship. The Episcopal Church expends an enormous amount of money to facilitate the triennial gathering of elected lay and clergy deputies who work in conjunction with its bishops to bring forward from the minds of its people resolutions that call us to broaden, enhance, develop and/or support initiatives that will positively influence our work as the Body of Christ. The fruits of this labor are usually left hanging to rot from a tree. The deputation can harvest this work and bring it to the diocese in due season for our collective benefit.

After discussion, the question was called on the amendment. The vote on the amendment passed.

The Bishop called for a report from the Reparations Task Force.

REPORT OF THE REPARATIONS TASK FORCE

Nancy Barrick, Co-Chair

After a late start the Task Force was instituted to oversee the discussion of reparations and report to you a sense of the mind of the diocese on the issue of restitution for slavery. We first did some self education---sharing articles per-

taining to racism and reparations, white privilege and discrimination. We found a wealth of current and past information. We discussed the terms and their meanings as well as a procedural approach. We invited Dr. Raymond Winbush, Director of Urban Studies at Morgan State University and author of, “*Should America Pay? Slavery and the Raging Debate on Reparations*,” to speak at the Cathedral on the topic of reparations. We were heartened that 27 parishes were represented.

Dr. Winbush informed us that reparations is not about a handout, but about justice. Slavery is a crime against humanity. We as a nation have not looked honestly and truthfully at the horrors of enslavement and its aftermath upon all of America. “We are told to ‘Remember the Alamo,’ ‘Remember the Maine,’ and celebrate the Fourth of July but don’t talk about slavery. Forget about it!”

The Task Force formulated a survey to ascertain some sense of how to proceed. The response to Dr. Winbush’s presentation was overwhelmingly positive, and there is a thirst for more dialogue. We strongly recommend that the Task Force be continued and that it be mandated that similar discussions take place in geographically feasible locations with trained facilitators to discuss responsibility, reparations and reconciliation.

A motion was duly made, seconded and passed to accept the recommendations to continue the Task Force and to mandate continued regional discussions and teaching.

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The next report on the agenda was given by the members on the Board of the Bishop Claggett Center. A short video was shown to the Convention highlighting the Groundbreaking events held at the Center in September. Mike Winn and David Mallery shared further updates and information about the building process at Claggett, and made themselves available for questions.

The Report of Mission Strategy was presented by Maurice Fox.

MISSION STRATEGY REPORT

During the November retreat, the Mission Strategy Group named “Inclusion” as a core value. Now that’s tough. Every *family* has a member, an uncle or cousin with whom we are cautious about including.

Besides, “You just can’t trust white people or Asians or black people or Africans or gay people or Hispanics or the rich or the poor. Hell, they even smell funny. If we let them in, we will lose the very essence of ourselves. And I want us to remain who we are. I don’t want to dilute the values of this parish. We value our chil-

dren. We value our heritage. We value our culture. We value our ethnicity. Those people will come in here and want to change things.”

That’s the sound of fear. I doubt if there are any clergy in the room who have never preached on the venomous and debilitating nature of fear. On occasion, I’m sure, you’ve expounded at great length about fear and how it constipates us and **binds up** our ability to reach out in love. As a result, some of us don’t want to be a part of God’s greater creation. We don’t want our children exposed to those sinners, do we?

But again, all of these aforementioned assertions are rooted in fear. And fear has never been stronger than it is today, because over the millennia, humankind has been virtually unchanged, at the core. And today we are aware of more things of which to fear, from pedophiles to terrorists.

What makes matters worse is that these assertions are based *just enough* in anecdotal truths to render them credible. Satan has used this tactic over and over, in the Garden of Eden, when tempting Christ during the Forty Days and Forty Nights, and even terrorists have used our sometimes less than righteous behavior as justification for their evil. Just this morning, I talked with a member of Paul Kim’s congregation, who expressed great disappointment in that it took 15 years to receive the level of acceptance and support that they felt last night – 15 years!

But despite Satan’s tricks, we *say* we value inclusion and justice and **seek to serve Christ in all persons**. We *say* inclusion is a core value of this Episcopal Diocese. So why then, do we continue to “gate keep” and shut down the differing voices that would be heard? Why do we persist in separating ourselves from the greater communion?

I submit to you that we suffer from an identity crisis, sometimes losing sight of whom we *really* are, just as Peter became distracted by the wind and waves and lost sight of Christ. Sometimes it comes to us for short intervals and we have an **epiphany**. But then fear sets in and we lose sight of it all. The fear makes us small. As Episcopalians, do we not share more in common than what we can point to as differences? Are we not larger than all of our differences? Do we not find both solace and challenge in the knowledge that we, **all of us**, are made in the image of God? And as Christians didn’t the awaited Holy Spirit of Pentecost transcend all boundaries of language and custom and culture?

So, acknowledging this problem, what are we going to do about it. Well, there are some recommendations to Program and Budget and so forth. Diocesan leadership pledges to continue to actively work toward greater inclusion but what about you in your parish?

For one moment, forget about me. Forget about whether or not you should have had that 2nd cup of coffee. Forget about the person sitting next to you and about what you have to face when you leave this place. Pretend that Bob Ihloff and John Rabb and Mary Glasspool aren't even in the room. Close your eyes and focus only on Christ and the cross.

Now, **What are you going to do about inclusion?**

REPORT OF THE SAFE CHURCH COMMITTEE

Good morning. I'm Stewart Lucas, Assistant to the Rector at Memorial Church in Baltimore and co-chair of the Safe Church Committee. In the fall of 2003, this committee was formed to reassess and make available the Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse. The Safe Church Committee was created with the encouragement of the bishops from a diverse group of members of the Diocese with broad experience in the field of protecting children and youth. The committee began meeting and researching possible resources as well as the history of these issues in the Diocese of Maryland.

In 2004 the Church Pension Group created a set of Model Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse, along with several resources for training volunteers and personnel. The committee reviewed these Model Policies and used them as the basis for the development of the Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse in the Diocese of Maryland.

This material is a compilation of information from the National Church, and resource material from the Catholic Archdiocese of Baltimore.

I'm Gwen Spicer, member of the Cathedral of the Incarnation, and the other co-chair of the Safe Church Committee. On behalf of the committee, we appreciate the time to speak briefly with you. Our mission is stated in the name of the committee, we are a group of people dedicated to the safe church. We are also an optimistic group and fully expected to have printed material for you today. However, you will go home several pounds lighter; the material will be sent in the mail in the coming weeks.

We would like to meet with you, at regional meetings or at your place of ministry, and develop a conversation about this aspect of ministry that we share. Our particular emphasis, at the moment, is children; and how we maintain a safe church for them. Children are not the only ones for whom the church may not be perceived to be safe. We expect to include other areas of concern and invite your comments and your ideas about where we might direct the attention of the committee in the future.

The committee will continue this work, providing training and important updates as needed and available. Many thanks for your attention and please contact either one of us with any questions or comments. Contact information is in the journal and on the website. We pray for you in your ministry and we ask your prayers in ours.

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The Bishop introduced Ellen Chatard, Director of Development and Communications for the Diocese, who briefly addressed the Convention stating that the mission of her office is to support parishes in their own financial development and invited parishes to call her office with their needs.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was continued, with Inez Haynie Dodson presenting.

RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 6-7, 2005, opposes discrimination on the basis of gender identity or expression as well as sexual orientation.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Secretary of Convention be directed to communicate this resolution to the Governor of Maryland and the members of the Maryland House of Delegates, Maryland Senate, and to the United States Senators from Maryland as well as the Maryland delegation to the U.S. House of Representatives.

EXPLANATION

In our Baptismal Covenant, we promise to strive for justice and peace among all people, and to respect the dignity of every human being. It has long been the policy of the Diocese of Maryland to oppose discrimination in all its forms. This resolution reaffirms and expands the scope of our commitment to inclusion, equality, and non-discrimination toward individuals and groups that have often been devalued and disregarded.

This resolution expands the 2000 Resolution D009 which reads:

“Resolved, That the 73rd General Convention of the Episcopal Church condemn all acts motivated by hate against any individual or group of persons as totally opposed to the gospel of Jesus Christ; and be it further Resolved, That this convention direct the national office of the Episcopal Church to continue and increase the “Stop the Hate” campaign, including making available congregational resources for promoting discussion and taking action against incidents of hate motivated by political or religious creed, race, color, ethnic or national origin, marital status, gender, sexual orientation, disabilities, or age; and be it further

Resolved, That this Convention urge its members to support the passage of local, state, and national hate crimes legislation which includes any of the above categories among its protected designations.”

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Having duly moved and seconded the motion, and a friendly amendment accepted, the discussion was complete, a moment of silent prayer was offered and the vote taken. (Although the report of the results did not take place immediately, as the written ballots were being counted, the Secretary of Convention later reported that the motion had received a total of 197 Yes votes and a total of 41 No votes.)

The resolution was therefore passed as printed.

RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 6-7, 2005, requests the Bishop of Maryland to appoint a task force of lay and clerical members to study issues of marriage, unions, and civil rights; to create a collection of resources and a study guide suitable for use in parishes to further conversation about appropriate Christian responses to questions about who should have access to civil marriage or unions; and to recommend appropriate pastoral responses to couples, regardless of sexual orientation, living in committed relationships other than marriage. The task force should report its findings at the 2006 Annual Convention of this diocese.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the task force appointed should reflect the diversity of the diocese with respect to age, race, order of ministry, marital status, sexual orientation and the diversity of opinion surrounding these issues.

EXPLANATION

The 74th General Convention, meeting in Minneapolis, passed resolution C051 which stated, in part, “That we commit ourselves, and call our church, in the spirit of Resolution A104 of the 70th General Convention (1991), to continued prayer, study, and discernment on the pastoral care for gay and lesbian persons, to include the compilation and development by a special commission organized and appointed by the Presiding Bishop of resources to facilitate as wide a conversation of discernment as possible throughout the church.”

In the Windsor Report the Lambeth Commission urges “all provinces that are engaged in processes of discernment regarding the blessing of same sex unions to engage the Communion in continuing study of biblical and theological rationale for and against such unions. Such a process of study and reflection needs to include clarification regarding the distinction, if such exists, between same sex un-

ions and same sex marriage. This call for continuing study does not imply approval of such proposals.” (Section A, #145.)

The proposed commission would continue the study of issues related to marriage, unions, and civil rights, educate parishes in their findings, and recommend appropriate pastoral care for gay and lesbian persons in the Diocese of Maryland. This resolution does not request any authorization of Rites of Blessing of same sex unions.

* * * * *

Prior to the completion of debate, a motion was duly made, seconded and passed that Convention reconsider its decision on voting by written ballot. Following proper procedure regarding the reconsideration of a vote, the Convention revoked the decision to vote by written ballot and decided, by voice vote, to decide on the remaining resolutions by standing vote.

After the acceptance of several friendly amendments, there were several amendments offered to the Resolution which were defeated. Following the completion of discussion, the Resolution was voted upon and passed as printed.

RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 6-7, 2005, opposes any amendment to the Constitution of the United States or the Maryland State Constitution which would prohibit civil marriage or unions between persons of the same sex.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Secretary of Convention is directed to communicate this resolution to the Governor of Maryland and to the members of the Maryland House of Delegates, Maryland Senate, and to the United States Senators from Maryland as well as the Maryland delegation to the U.S. House of Representatives.

EXPLANATION

There have been a number of proposals to amend the U.S. and Maryland State constitutions for the purpose of prohibiting marriage and/or civil unions between persons of the same sex, including Maryland House Bill 1220. These attempts to modify the federal and state constitutions would create new discriminatory barriers to gay and lesbian persons who desire equality in taxation, child custody, personal finances, and the right to make health care decisions for elderly or sick partners. They also would obstruct the progress being made by some jurisdictions where new understandings of civil marriage are evolving. In Massachusetts, Vermont, Canada, and several western European countries, a legal bond between committed, life-long, monogamous couples is recognized by the state for purposes of taxation, property ownership, inheritance, parental rights, and health care. The proposed constitutional amendments close the door on such solutions and encumber future leaders with a discriminatory provision that would be difficult to change. The blessing of marriages as religious sacraments is performed separately by the church and is not required or suggested by this resolution.

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After discussion, and the acceptance of a friendly amendment, the Resolution was voted upon and passed as printed.

RESOLVED, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 6-7, 2005, supports efforts to provide basic benefits to same-sex couples, including but not limited to full privileges of joint ownership of real property, inheritance without discriminatory treatment in tax law, equal child custody and visitation privileges, the ability to make hospital visits with an incapacitated partner as well as the authority to make decisions regarding medical treatment and the disposition of bodily remains,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of Convention is directed to communicate this resolution to the members of the Maryland House of Delegates, Maryland Senate, the Governor of Maryland and to the United States Senators from Maryland as well as the Maryland delegation to the U.S. House of Representatives.

EXPLANATION

The 1994 Resolution D-006 reads “*Resolved*, the House of Bishops concurring, That the 71st General Convention call upon municipal council, state legislatures and the United States Congress to approve measures giving gay and lesbian couples protection[s] such as: bereavement and family leave policies; health benefits, pension benefits; real-estate transfer tax benefits, and commitments to mutual support enjoyed by non-gay married couples.”

Because same-sex couples are currently excluded from civil marriage under the laws of the State of Maryland and the federal Defense of Marriage Act, numerous discriminatory barriers exist that exclude such couples from basic civil rights including the right to make health care decisions for a sick partner, the right to visit a partner in a health care facility, and the right to inherit property and make funeral arrangements when a partner dies. Several attempts have been made in the Maryland General Assembly to remove these barriers from the law, including the Basic Human Rights Act of 2005 and the Medical Decision Making Act of 2005. The Episcopal Diocese of Maryland should support these pieces of legislation and others like them as a witness to our commitment to “strive for justice and peace for all people and respect the dignity of every human being.” (BCP, p. 305)

Having been duly moved and seconded, and several friendly amendments accepted, the discussion was completed, the resolution was voted upon and passed.

The chairperson of the Committee on Resolutions announced that this concluded the report of the Committee on Resolutions regarding all submitted resolutions (2005:1-9)

The Youth Delegates and Pages presented a “Response from Youth” and were given a standing ovation upon completion of their comments.

With the business of Convention having been completed, the Convention was adjourned with the Bishop's blessing.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN REPORT

The Diocese of Maryland's capital campaign, *Building on Faith for the Future*, was brought to a close at this 221st Annual Convention. The capital campaign, authorized at a special convention in October of 2001 to raise funds for the revitalization of the Bishop Claggett Center and start new churches in the Diocese of Maryland, concluded with a total of \$2.5 million in cash and pledges. Over 400 parishioners, clergy, churches and foundations throughout the diocese made commitments to the campaign.

We are most grateful for the leadership of the four dedicated people who chaired this campaign over the last 3 years. They are: Elizabeth Winn, Martin K.P. Hill, the Reverend Florence Ledyard and the Reverend William H.C. Ticknor. Additionally, many other volunteers devoted numerous hours to various aspects of the campaign, among them special thanks to: Lisa Mallery, chair of the special events committee, Martha Horton, chair of the spiritual life committee and James Piper, leadership gifts chair.

The result of the capital campaign is a good beginning for what will be an ongoing effort to raise capital funds for the Bishop Claggett Center and other diocesan needs.

The Maryland Episcopal Public Policy Network (MEPPN) affairs come under the supervision of the Rev. Carl Rehling, Liaison for Justice and Peace. As the Bishops' Deputy for Public Policy I serve as the "Episcopal Voice in Annapolis" before the Maryland General Assembly. Madeleine Beard, deacon in training, has been of tremendous help to me in setting up the MEPPN Legislative Alert Email Bulletins so that subscribers can be informed and contact their legislators on Diocesan positions.

Social justice issues we are involved in include: Opposing the Governor's efforts to legalize slot machines in Maryland, repeal the death penalty, access to health care, supporting gun control, hate crime bills, embryonic stem cell research, trying to reduce the negative impact of state agency budget cuts to senior citizens and the poor, and extending health rights to domestic partners.

Legislative or public policy issues are taken from those adopted at the General Convention and the Executive Council resolutions in counsel with the Bishop.

In the past year Madeleine has been successful in expanding our link off of Episcopal Diocese's web page, and broadening our contacts with the Episcopal Diocese of Washington DC - which, in Maryland, encompasses churches in Montgomery, Prince George's, Charles and St. Mary's counties.

Now, they can link up with MEPPN and send information to their email subscribers on legislative bills before the Maryland General Assembly.

In September, Carl, Madeleine and I visited the Episcopal Washington Office of Government Relations to review ways the two organizations could share information and lists of email subscribers – on state and federal issues.

The St. Mary's Outreach Center has continued to grow and expand its ministry in Hampden, Baltimore City and the Diocese during 2004-2005. The center, a funded partnership between the Diocese and St. David's church, has focused its efforts this year on building the Center's own programming and integrating all the other programs offered by its tenants in order to provide an empowering ministry of God's presence both in service and worship. An Advisory Board oversees the policy and programs for the Center, while the day-to-day operations and program development are under the oversight of the Director, Kristofer Lindh-Payne.

The Center continues to offer exciting activities nearly every day of the week. New as a tenant of the Center this year, and connected to one of the Center's core ministries, is Action In Maturity, a non-profit organization that provides transportation and programming for older adults.

AIM's programs mesh well with the health and fitness programs offered several days a week to seniors at the Center by Union Memorial Hospital. This summer Senior Luncheons will be offered at the Center. There will be an opportunity for many seniors to gather for food and fellowship and programs. Also beginning late this summer will be an inter-generational vegetable garden at the Center - bringing together seniors, young people and a love for God's creation. It is exciting to see ministry to older adults begin to take shape and form in Hampden, where there has been a lack of programming in the past.

Other important needs in Hampden have also been the focus of the work of the Center. This year the Director has participated in the Hampden Drug Task Force which is a partnership of several organizations (including Episcopal Community Services of Maryland and the Knott Foundation) devoted to devel-

oping strategies to attack the significant drug problem in Hampden. The Center believes one of its major priorities must be to assist the families in the community who are affected by addiction problems. The goal is establish programs that lead to recovery and to family wholeness.

A vibrant worship experience, based at the Center, is also a central priority. This year Without Walls, the multi-parish worship cooperative, which offers “eU2charist”, has used the Center as its base of operations. A committee has been formed to explore ways to make the Center home to a number of varied worshipping communities, including eU2charist, a regular Sunday worship community, and other alternative worship events. The Board is committed to keeping Christ at the heart of the Center’s life and programming.

In addition to regular programming and worship events, this year has seen a significant increase in the use of the Center as a performance venue for the community. The Baltimore Shakespeare Festival again offered three exciting productions at the Center, as well as classes to those in the community. Gimme Shelter Productions, the Lay School of Theology, meetings for the Diocese and concerts have all been part of the active life of the Center.

The Center also has full-time tenants who offer services to Hampden and the Diocese. Those tenants include the Episcopal Housing Corporation, the St. David Nearly New Shop, AIM, and the Baltimore Shakespeare Festival.

We ask your prayers for our important work of ministry and fellowship at this wonderful Outreach Center.

The Episcopal Housing Corporation, the St. David’s Nearly New Shop, and the Baltimore Shakespeare Festival all continue to operate from the church and its buildings at 3900 Roland Avenue.
