MINUTES OF THE CONVENTION

Friday, May 4, 2007

The 223rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Maryland was held at the Marriott Hotel in Hunt Valley, Maryland on May 4-5, 2007.

The Convention began with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist at 9:30 a.m. with the bishop-in-charge, the Rt. Rev. John L. Rabb as celebrant and the bishop of Mississippi, the Rt. Rev. Duncan Gray III, as preacher.

Following the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Convention was called to order by the Bishop Rabb at 11:00 a.m.

The delegates and visitors were welcomed and Bishop Rabb offered the opening prayer.

In accordance with the Parliamentary Process set out for Convention, the Bishop-in-Charge called upon the Committee on Rights to Seat for a report of a quorum. After reading the numbers of certified lay and clergy delegates registered and present at the Convention, the Rev. William Smith reported that a quorum was present.

The Convention affirmed the above nominees by voice vote.

In accordance with General Convention mandates, the secretary of convention, the Rev. Richard A. Ginnever, offered the Reading of the 75th General Convention resolutions required to be read at Diocesan Conventions. A motion to dispense with the reading of the resolutions, with the understanding that the delegates would review them (Pre-Convention Journal, page 140), was passed.

The Convention passed a Courtesy Motion giving Seat and Voice but not Vote to clergy living in the Diocese of Maryland but not canonically resident.

A welcome was extended by the co-chairpersons of the Convention Planning Team; the Rev. Joanna White and Mr. William Lambert. The bishop offered the Convention’s thanks to the entire Planning Team.

The Bishop-in-Charge called for the report of the Nominating Committee. Ms. Carrie Brown, co-chairperson of the Nominating Committee, placed in nomination all those whose names are already printed in the Pre-Convention Journal. The bishop opened the process for nominations from the floor.

Nominated from the floor:
For Ecclesiastical Court – Lay Person

A042: Church Planting Initiative. Calls on every diocese to identify and document prime opportunities for the development of new congregations.

Refer to Mission Strategy Group

A077: Revised Common Lectionary. Directs that the Revised Common Lectionary be the lectionary of this Church, amending the lectionary effective the First Sunday of Advent 2007, with the provision for continued use of the previous lectionary for purposes of orderly transition, until the First Sunday of Advent 2010.

Refer to Liturgy and Music Committee

A123: Slavery and Racial Reconciliation. Requests that the presiding bishop name a Day of Repentance and, on that day, hold a Service of Repentance at the National Cathedral, and ask each diocese to hold a similar service.

Refer to Reparations Task Force

A156: Sexual Exploitation. Affirms work being done in many dioceses regarding sexual misconduct and directs that each diocese shall report to the House of Bishops Committee on Pastoral Development prior to the spring 2009 meeting with a copy of its adopted and implemented policy and an evaluation of the history of its use.

Refer to Mending Creation Ministry

D022: MDGs and the ONE Episcopalian Campaign. Establishes work toward the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals as a mission priority for this triennium, urges each diocese, congregation and parishioner to commit to 0.7% giving by July 7, 2007 (07/07/07). Endorses The ONE Campaign.

Refer to Diocesan Council

Following the presentation of the resolution and the bishop reminding Convention of the norms adopted to accept all comments prayerfully and respectfully, the Question was called.

The motion was adopted by a unanimous vote

The Chairperson of the Resolutions Committee next presented Resolution 2007-2 to the Convention for consideration.

RESOLUTION 2007-2

Memorial to the 76th General Convention of the Episcopal Church for the addition of the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray to *Lesser Feasts and Fasts* (for future editions to be authorized by the General Convention.

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, memorialize the 76th General Convention of the Episcopal Church meeting in Anaheim, California in 2009 to add the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray to *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*; and be it further

RESOLVED, that we urge General Convention to have July 1 as the date for her commemoration, marking the date of her death; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Maryland work in collaboration with the Diocese of North Carolina, where she was raised, and the Diocese of Massachusetts, from which she was ordained as deacon and priest, to bring this memorial to General Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention of the Diocese of Maryland declares that July 1 be a day of special commemoration for the life, witness and ministry of the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray.

Following the presentation of this Resolution, a friendly amendment was accepted changing the date requested for her remembrance from January 8th (the date of her ordination to the Priesthood) to July 1st (the date of her death.) This was due to the fact that January 8th was already taken of the Episcopal Church calendar.

The motion was adopted by a unanimous vote

The dispatcher of business, the Rev. Canon Mary Glasspool, presented announcements, which were followed by grace led by Mr. William Lambert. The Convention recessed for lunch.

During the lunch break and into the early afternoon, the National Church Health Fair was offered to the delegates and visitors.

The Convention reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with prayer led by the Rev. Kristen Looney.

The first order of business for the afternoon was the presentation of several of the Bishops' Awards.

Bishop Rabb made the following announcements and presentations:

The Bishop's Award for **Outstanding Lay Ministry in the World** was presented to Nancy Barrick.

The first of the Bishop's Awards for **Outstanding Clergy Leadership** was presented to the Rev. Adrien Dawson.

The second of the Bishop's Awards for **Outstanding Clergy Leadership** was presented to the Rev William Chip Lee.

Following thunderous applause from the Convention for each of the award recipients, the Bishop presented his address to Convention.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

The Rt. Rev. John L. Rabb

In Samuel Becket's play, *Waiting for Godot*, Vladimir asks Ponzio, "Where are you going?" And he replies, "On." So it is with us as the Diocese of Maryland, we are going **ON**. When Bob Ihloff announced his retirement he noted to me, "The last thing I want to have happen is for a diocesan convention to spend all its time looking back, they need to look forward. I shared with Bob that the greatest gift he gave Maryland was a vision of mission. The greatest thank you we can give Bob and Nancy is to lovingly be **on with mission**."

I have for over 20 years been challenged by the work in family systems by the late Rabbi Edwin Friedman. In his recently and posthumously published book *A Failure of Nerve* he challenges leadership and vision in many profound ways. One that is especially important to us in Maryland, in the Episcopal Church and in the Anglican Communion is to shift the paradigm from endlessly seeking answers to old questions to seeking to ask the right, and new, question. He notes "Seeking answers can be its own treadmill. Changing the

question enables one to step off.” (*A Failure of Nerve, 2007, p. 38*) The present challenges and tensions can, if we faithfully move on, open the door to a deeper and more faithful discipleship. I believe the question before us as a diocese, a church and a communion is what does it mean to be the Church? What does it mean that Christ has called and the Holy Spirit has empowered a body to be instruments of God’s salvation?

To work at this question will take prayer, patience, a greater dependence upon the grace of God and a willingness to go deeper in our relationships. My worry is that we will be too impatient, lack the will, and be too anxious and tragically lazy about our theology and the needed work to answer the challenges. However like any human person, I worry. But as a person of faith, I am hopeful.

I was recently asked at a vestry meeting during a visitation, “Bishop, are you optimistic that we can stay together as a church?” My reply then as now is this. Optimism is the easy and sentimental work of looking at things through rose-colored glasses. As Christians we must be a people of hope, because it is at the heart of who we are. Yes, I am hope-filled because I do believe Christ Jesus is calling us to a newer and deeper identity as a church. I am hope-filled because I see in the midst of the conflicts, the disagreements and the distrust what has been the case through the ages that the church is always on the way - on the way as God’s people, as Christ’s communion and as a community inspired by the Holy Spirit. I am hopeful.

We embrace the Millennium Development Goals because we know these are consistent with the vision and dream of God, of bringing health, healing and the abundance of life to all of God’s people. We embrace the partnerships of a larger communion because the vision of God is for us to work as one and not separately. The partnerships we have in the larger church, across the communion and with other churches and faiths are signs of the vision our Lord gives us in two places. In Matthew 25:40 he tells us that what we do to the least of our sisters and brothers we do for Him. In Matthew 28 he tells us that we are to go and preach the gospel to all nations. The gospel is not multiple choice! We are called to do both.

There is with the gospel a scandalous particularity. At the same time we must be focused on the larger life we must have as the Episcopal Church and as the Anglican Communion, God has work for us to do here in Maryland. Transition times can be times of anxiety.

My first goal for this next year plus is for us not to be anxious, but to be about the good work of mission. One thing I will assure you of is that we will not

tread water and just wait! To be such would be to deny that we are, in fact, 45,000 plus Christian missionaries with only about 240 or so ordained persons! Chronic anxiety is born of the uncertain, the fear and the apprehension that so abounds in our culture. But we are Christians and we know what we are called to do and to be. I am committed to continually calling us to the deeper mission we have as the Church.

My second focus is on resources. We live a diocese that has significant areas of need, urban and rural. But we also live in one of the most prosperous and growing parts of the United States. Our *bimetroplitanism* only increases the population and resource growth we are experiencing. (Do you like that word? I stayed up two nights just thinking of it!)

The Baltimore and Washington areas are growing and are slated for even more growth, and now areas once rural and small town are now solidly suburban. Yet our stewardship remains weak. I am concerned that we are not growing in resources. I want to see us move from a stance of scarcity to one of abundance. It is not about what we do not have, but about what we have, and have in greater abundance. I challenge each congregation to seek to be more generous and to begin to work from abundance, not scarcity.

Resources also involve how we live in the larger community. Our hospitality and our evangelism cannot grow if we live as though we have too little. Then we simply tell the larger world, there is not much happening here! Good stewardship does beget good evangelism because it changes the focus from maintenance to mission, from inward looking to outward looking, from what we cannot do to what we can do and, finally, from worrying about ourselves to seeking new ways to serve Christ's kingdom and people.

Third, I want to complete the second phase of the wonderful new facilities we have at the Bishop Claggett Center. The new facilities are magnificent! They give new life and meaning to our formation, to our mission, to serving all of God's people and to our hospitality. With the good work of many of you and in particular our Development Commission and development staff we want to pay off the first phase and lay the ground work to the next phase, the adult lodge. We can do this! We have the resources and out of our abundance I am hopeful we will meet the challenge.

Fourth I want to see the Mutual Ministry Program in western Maryland reach the point where it is in full bloom. Under the clergy leadership of Richard Morley, western Maryland missionary, Elizabeth Webster, assistant missionary, and William "Chip" Lee, Garrett County missionary we now have four mutual ministry teams: St. James', Westernport; St. Peter's, Lonaconing, St. John's,

Frostburg; and in Garrett County at St. Matthew's, Oakland; St. John's, Deer Park; and Our Father's House, Altamont. In July I will ordain and commission the first team at St. James'. This new idea of a locally discerned, formed and functioning team has brought new life, energy and mission to these congregations. And might I say they are growing! We participated in the Linn, Stones Coalition, a coalition of American and Canadian diocese doing mutual ministry, earlier this year. Through the Episcopal Church this new model is giving life and vitality to small churches. Remember that our Presiding Bishop not only was bishop of a mutual ministry diocese, but when elected in Nevada was the coordinator of mutual ministry for the Diocese of Oregon.

One of the greatest challenges we face is in Baltimore City. So my fifth goal is to build on work already underway to strengthen our city congregations. While we have some large, resourceful and prosperous city churches, we have many with few resources. And yet these churches are so often doing incredible ministries, far beyond what they really have!

Look at Guardian Angel in Remington, the Spirit of the Child at St. James in Irvington, Holy Nativity in Pimlico, St. Luke's on Carey Street, and St. Andrew's on Loch Raven Boulevard, our most multi-cultural and multi-racial churches. And there is much, much more that I could say and more churches I could name. I serve as President of Episcopal Urban Caucus. More and more I am convinced that our ability to bring the needed economic, educational, health care and safety reforms we need is directly related to having strong and vital communities of faith. It means being the Church, being the Church in the City!

Many of these churches have great opportunities, but have costly facilities, people with few resources and more and more demands. We must direct both greater resources and greater mission to our urban churches.

The Mission Strategy Group, under the leadership of the Rev. Mark Stanley, chair, and the Rev. David Showers, chair of the Urban Task Force, are beginning a process to work with the 32 churches in the city and in its closest suburbs to survey needs and opportunities. I am asking that we set up in January of 2008 a summit on the city. I do not want to presume the outcome of resolution that will come later to this convention. But if it is passed then it will be coordinated with the commemoration to have a full day with a speaker and workshops to energize and excite us about urban ministry.

The Standing Committee with the Search and Nominating Committee and the Transition Committee is working on the necessary steps as we move towards

and election and a consecration of a new diocesan bishop. And when that process is complete and we celebrate on June 28, 2008, I want a new colleague to find a diocese on the way, on the way in mission.

So where are we going? We are going on. We are seeking in active mission to ask and seek what it is Christ is calling us to do and to be as the Church. We do so as we work to serve God and God's people as God's Church. Amen.

The 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church took place in Columbus, Ohio from June 12 - 21, 2006. Of lasting and striking importance was the election of both a new presiding bishop: The Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori; a new President of the House of Deputies: Ms. Bonnie Anderson; the establishment of achieving the Millennium Development Goals as a mission priority along with the endorsement of the ONE Episcopalian Campaign; work on Church Reparations for Slavery; a host of resolutions on justice, liturgical and ministry issues; and six resolutions addressing the Anglican Com-

munion and our Church's relationships and commitments to it and in it. These last were watched closely by people throughout the Anglican Communion as our Church made every effort to respond clearly, solidly, and fully to recommendations of the Windsor Report, published in October of 2004. Our Church not only “expressed regret for straining the bonds of affection in the events surrounding the General Convention of 2003,” but it also offered “its sincerest apology to those within the Anglican Communion who are offended by our failure to accord sufficient importance to the impact of our actions on our church and other parts of the Communion” and asked forgiveness. We reaffirmed in the clearest and strongest possible terms our commitment to interdependence in the Anglican Communion and our “desire to live into the highest degree of communion possible.” And we further pledged our commitment to the Listening Process and the Anglican Covenant Development Process - both of which were recommended in the Windsor Report. On the last day of General Convention, we passed Resolution B033, which “Calls upon Standing Committees and bishops with jurisdiction to exercise restraint by not consenting to the consecration of any candidate to the episcopate whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion.” You have probably heard much about this last, and doubtless you will hear more before this Convention is over. So I want to use this time to urge all of our participation in the Listening and Covenanting Processes, which, unfortunately, have gotten far less publicity.

First, I have a confession to make. I’ve been thinking a lot lately about the Primates, the Anglican leaders of the 38 Provinces worldwide. Whenever they meet, we usually read about it in the newspapers and online and we read their communiques and other people’s commentaries on their communiques and we may even have *responses* to their communiques. And I was thinking. There are approximately 77 million Anglicans in the world who comprise the Anglican Communion. And there are 38 Primates. I’m not a numbers person so I did have to use a calculator, but I divided 38 by 77 million to discover what percentage of the Anglican Communion the Primates are by number and I got this: the Primates are four one-hundred-thousandths of a percent of the Anglican Communion! Now I say this with all due respect - and I’m not stupid: I realize that the Primates are chosen leaders of their Provinces. But the Episcopal Church is not exclusively a hierarchical Church. We are also a Church that values and honors the voices of lay people, deacons, and priests as well as bishops. We are a ***both-and*** Church, not an either-or Church. And every single one of us here is invited to participate in the Listening and Covenanting Processes of the Anglican Communion!

First, the Listening Process. After resolutions at Lambeth 1978, Lambeth 1988, and Lambeth 1998 repeatedly urged the Anglican Communion to ***listen*** to the voices of its homosexual members, as well as to engage in mutual listening on issues of human sexuality, on January 1, 2006, the Anglican Com-

munion Office finally hired a full-time person: the Rev. Canon Phil Groves, to coordinate the Listening Process among the 38 Provinces. After a year of intense work, each of the 38 Provinces submitted a report on the Listening Process within their own Province. These reports reflect a huge spectrum of difference in process as well as content - culture as well as theology - and they are fascinating to read! Summaries of these reports are posted online - and I've asked our Youth pages to circulate green sheets with the relevant online addresses at the conclusion of this report. Based on the Listening Process, a "Study Guide on Human Sexuality" has been prepared for Lambeth 2008. It, too, is posted online. The practice of *deep listening* to one another is a spiritual as well as a physical discipline. There's quite a lot for us to read, and "listen to," and there is also a way to offer input and feedback. I commend to you this ongoing aspect of the life of our Anglican Communion, of which you and I are a part.

Second, the Covenanting Process. The Anglican Covenanting Process is a bit more complex. Many of you will remember that the Windsor Report contained a model for a possible covenant. The Archbishop of Canterbury appointed a "Covenant Design Group" that met January 15 - 18, 2007 in the Bahamas and drew up a different draft covenant to which we are all being asked to respond. Let me be clear, if not emphatic, that this is a *process*, not a *product*. The four-page draft document is available on the web for any and all to read. Our own presiding bishop and the president of the House of Deputies appointed an ad hoc Committee of the Executive Council to develop and distribute a study guide for this draft covenant. That study guide is also available online - and for those of you who do not like the idea of an Anglican Covenant because you don't see why the Baptismal Covenant doesn't cover it, the very first question in the Study Guide is *Do you think an Anglican Covenant is necessary and/or will help to strengthen the interdependent life of the Anglican Communion? Why or why not?* Executive Council and the leaders of our Church really want to hear from us! Each of us has a voice, and we minister in a Church in which you don't have to be a Primate to be heard. So I urge your participation, either individually or in a group process within your parish, so that we are fully a part of this important dialogue. Responses are due June 4, 2007 - so we have a whole month during which to do this.

So friends and colleagues: I commend to your attention the Listening and Covenanting Processes that our own General Convention commends to us. I can't help but believe that when Jesus says in John's Gospel that the Spirit, the Holy Spirit, Jesus' Spirit, will guide us into all truth, that that means we have to *listen* for the Spirit and be open to the Spirit. We have to listen for the Spirit in each other, and others across the world as members of the Body of Christ in the world. Because when we really *listen* to one another, and allow ourselves to be guided into God's Truth, then we can proclaim with joy right

along with the writer of Ephesians: *Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine: Glory to him from generation to generation in the Church, and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. Amen.* (Ephesians 3:21-22)

REPORT OF DIOCESAN COUNCIL

Bishops, -- clergy and lay delegates, -- and guests:

A fascinating book I read, recently, about the history of maps caused me to contemplate the task of ancient mapmakers trying to outline a distant land they had never seen. Without navigators and plotters, how is an accurate picture possible? -- Thank God for comptrollers -- principally ours, Karen Stewart. For Diocesan Council she plots our financial terrain, -- explains the highs and the lows and where things are flat. We learned from her on our retreat what a daunting task it is to find funding for unplanned events, such as flooding while at the same time having cumbersome restrictions. The most kindly looking person on council startled us all by responding to a fictitious funding dilemma -- "Well, I would just tell them to screw it" -- Oh, my! . . . Yes, council members are just like all of you out there -- perfect Episcopalians!

In spite of our dependence on e-mail and web-site information, Council members still travel from all the extremities of our diocese to meet together and accept the hospitality of parishes throughout our realm. With a unified voice, we passed a balanced budget pummeled into shape by the dedicated Program and Budget committee. Jim Rauth chaired a hard working team that made an excess of one million dollars of requests fall away into oblivion -- and yet left room for the first mandated 0.7% line item for Millennium Development Goals. It was exciting to approve the newly formed Global Mission Committee's recommendations to fund projects in Ghana, Honduras, and Panama. Our canonical charge over receipts and disbursements is often procedural. But

with anticipation, all of us awaited news of successful diocesan property sales, the principle means of reducing our Diocesan debt. We monitored sale activity at Holy Cross, Millington; Annapolis Junction; Frederick; and Canton. Then, we decided to honor the ministry of our retiring Diocesan Bishop by reserving 1.6 million dollars from the sale of the land in Frederick for *the Bishop Robert W. Ihloff Fund for Congregational Development*. This fund will aid existing congregations in need, many of which are under the watch of our Urban Ministry Task Force. We believe that this kind of support will get many churches over a hump, hopefully alleviating the run to appeal diocesan apportionments.

I am happy to report that Appeals this year were far fewer than the usual – seven (7) this year -- as opposed to twenty-one (21) last year, and most pledge payments came in on time. Council is submitting resolution 12 at this convention to institute a revision in the apportionment formula that was used on a trial basis this past year. The results proved excellent. The revised formula encourages outreach and on time payments off-setting the reduced apportionments. Fewer congregations making appeals will benefit both diocese and parishes.

Now, the best of all! After nearly a decade of planning, fundraising, and construction we blessed the new dining and meeting facility at Claggett. The plotters and dreamers cooperated on this project so that we have a beautiful space for ministry and fellowship. And there is room to grow. Council, as the financial overseer for the new construction, is hopeful about continued donor support to quickly pay off this 4.9 million-dollar project. We want to move on to Phase II – the Adult Lodge - but we have committed to pay for Phase I first.

I have just shared with you a few highlights of Council's work this year. You can read a more comprehensive report in the post-convention journal. Today you elect some new members for council. Some regions will also elect new council reps whose role it is to convey back to the regions the work we do. To those council members who end terms now, my gratitude for your service.

Diocesan business is a balance of diligence and faith – of plotting and dreaming. I prefer dreaming and have so depended this past year on Susan Beares, the planning team chair, and Anne Gross, secretary. With GPS attentiveness they kept straight the canonical requirements, pithy financial statements, convention resolutions, and pending business.

Our 21 elected Council members, the Bishop and other officers and ex-officio members bring different perspectives, theologies, and personalities but we

break bread together and then do the work God has given us to do. This is not the “Diocese of Make Believe” – this is the real place where we dwell and worship -- and we do it so well together.

I thank all of you.

Caring for God’s Creation through Waste Prevention and Recycling

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, responding to the efforts of our bishops and the Committee on the Environment (COE), encourages every parish and mission to establish waste prevention and recycling programs for special emphasis on environmental awareness and its theological appropriateness; and be it further

RESOLVED, that each congregation, as part of its Stewardship responsibility, is urged to undertake waste prevention and recycling activities to care for God’s creation through sermons and adult and church school education, utilizing the Catechism of Creation developed by the Episcopal Church; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention urges parishes to designate Rogation Sunday each year as Stewardship of Creation Sunday.”

Upon the acceptance of a friendly amendment to change from “the Sunday closest to Earth Day,” to Rogation Sunday, and a second friendly amendment adding the Catechism of Creation;

The motion was adopted by a voice vote

The Chairperson of the Resolutions Committee presented Resolution 2007-4 to the Convention for consideration:

RESOLUTION 2007-4

Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, continue its commitment to being a living wage institution and, therefore, any employee of any congregation be paid a wage of not less than \$9.62 per hour, and that health benefits be available to any employee working at least 20 hours per week; and be it further

RESOLVED, that all clergy and lay employees be granted an annual review of performance that should consider merit increases in compensation as appropriate; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the annual salary increase for parochial clergy and congregational lay employees for 2008 shall be the total of a 2.5% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) on the 2007 salary plus any increase based on responsibilities and performance; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the annual compensation for parochial priests for 2008 be increased by an equity adjustment of 1.0% to begin to address the approximately 10% median underpayment of Diocese of Maryland clergy as compared to clergy in close-by dioceses; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention adopts the following Honoraria for supply clergy for 2008:

1 service	between \$75 and \$175
2 services	between \$100 and \$225
3 services	between \$150 and \$275
Guest Preacher	minimum of \$125

(Midweek services may be compensated at a lesser rate)

and further directs that travel expenses be reimbursed in compliance with the Internal Revenue Service Guidelines; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention urges all congregations to provide fair, equitable, and competitive compensation to all persons providing program ser-

vices such as, but not limited to, director of music, choir director, director of christian education, and director of youth programs. Information concerning appropriate compensation can be obtained from the diocesan office. Suggested salary ranges are available for the compensation of church organists and choir directors based on information from the American Guild of Organists and the Association of Anglican Musicians; and be it further

RESOLVED, that for transitional deacons and newly ordained priests for the first year following their ordination to the priesthood, the minimum annual Total Cash Compensation (TCC) will be \$47,200; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the suggested range of TCC for experienced clergy who are hired as assistant rectors or associate rectors is \$49,300 to \$76,400; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention adopts the following TCC criteria for full-time clergy in charge of congregations within the diocese for the year 2008.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

Good Afternoon, Ladies and Gentlemen. I am Doug Vaughan, the diocesan treasurer.

Before I review our financial position for 2006, I would like to recognize the first 11 congregations who sent in their 2006 parochial reports before the March 1 deadline. I also want to thank all congregations for completing their reports. The 11 early-bird parishes that had their reports in by February 23 were:

I would also like to recognize all the volunteers who served on the Financial Advisory Board, Program and Budget Committee, and the Investment Committee. The task of fiscal responsibility is intense and time consuming. I just want you to know we could not manage this without all the members' help. I especially want to thank Steve Sands, my predecessor, who served as our diocesan treasurer for the last four, often financially challenging, years.

Now for the 2006 financial highlights:

Our annual audit for 2006 was completed by McGladrey & Pullen, Certified Public Accountants. We have received a clean audit opinion. This is the second year that the audit was completed prior to the convention. I wish to thank Karen Stewart, comptroller/assistant treasurer, and the Business Office staff for their hard work and long hours invested in this task while continuing their normal day-to-day operations of congregational and diocesan program support. The full results of this audit will be delivered to Financial Advisory Board, and Diocesan Council at their next meetings.

Here are a few highlights from 2006:

1. Congregations allocations made up 81% of our total cash received in 2006.
2. We withdrew 4.5 percent of our unrestricted investments for use in our ministry for a total of \$408,053. This withdrawal made up 11 percent of our total cash received in 2006. In 2007 we will continue to withdraw 4.5 percent of our investments or \$419,705.
3. The remaining 8 percent of income came from restricted funds either raised for diocesan programs through the Bishops' Appeal or drawn from our endowments and investments.
4. We utilized our funds efficiently, as 97 percent of our funds were spent on direct ministry while spending only 3 percent of the revenue for administration and fund raising. A few of the ministries paid for by your allocation are:

5. Did you know that .20 cents of every dollar contributed through your allocations was sent to Domestic Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS) in 2006? We sent \$533,019 to aid in ministries around the U.S. and the world.

Now let me spotlight other financial facts:

Although we started 2006 with a budget balanced to zero, we ended 2006 with a \$127,000 deficit. This deficit was largely caused by late payments of congregational allocations, unanticipated property expenses, and longer than an-

anticipated debt service due to delayed property sales.

Our budget is brought into balance by authorizing only the amount of expenses covered by anticipated revenue or cash due in throughout the year. We had a short-fall in congregational allocations of approximately \$131,000 on December 31, 2006. Although we did receive a large portion of these funds in 2007, our cash flow was seriously impacted because we had to pay budget expenses before we received budgeted revenue.

Our property expenses continue to be high because of our aging buildings, which require extensive maintenance. Property costs consumed 14 percent of total expenditures in 2006. We do not see much of a decrease in this ratio for 2007.

We have recently completed our new dining hall and conference facility at the Bishop Claggett Center in Buckeystown. It is a beautiful complex that will add greatly to our ministry. I urge you to visit the Bishop Claggett Center if you have not yet had a chance to see this splendid addition to Claggett. The total projected cost for this project was \$5.3 million inclusive of building and development cost. Although we had received approximately \$2.4 million through the Capital Campaign, we have had to borrow \$2.3 million, and anticipate borrowing an additional \$600,000 in 2007, to complete the project. Although we are actively pursuing ways to eliminate this debt, we anticipate paying approximately \$200,000 in interest only payments in 2007. This amount represents 5 percent of the total 2007 budget. It is our goal to reduce this debt as soon as possible.

The year ahead....

In conclusion, I would like to say we had a good year although we continue to be financially challenged. 2007 is starting out in a positive way with good communication and shared resources within our diocese. It is clear to me that we are one Church with our focus on partnering with mission and ministry.

Although we are collectively facing financial challenges, we are continuing to encourage and follow good stewardship practices utilizing all funds raised to benefit ministry and missions of our Church in the Diocese of Maryland, the United States, and the world.

Our audited financial statement will be available on our website after presentation to Diocesan Council in June. Karen Stewart would like me to remind you that the Diocesan Business Office is a shared resource for each

congregation. So please feel free to call her if you have any questions or concerns. Transparency of financial activities is very important because this is our diocese and we all have a part in ensuring stewardship and ministry fulfillment.

Communications and Development

Ms. Ellen Chatard, Mr. Jason Hoffman, the Rev. Amy Richter and the Rev. Canon Dr. Mark Gatza presented the work and programs of communication and development. Of particular emphasis was the Legacy Society and planned giving, the updating of the diocesan database and several programs being offered through the diocese in the upcoming months.

Bishop Claggett Center

Mr. David Mallery and the Rev. Allen Spicer presented the report and invited Convention to watch a short video about the work of the center, followed by a presentation concerning the programs.

REPORT OF EPISCOPAL RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT

Thank you so much for the opportunity to share with you our participation in the mission of Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD). ERD helps the Church answer God's call to serve Christ in all persons as stated in our mandate—Matthew 25:37-40 caring for the sick, feeding the hungry, and welcoming the stranger.

In 2005 this diocese donated \$652,973 to ERD, much in response to the devastating hurricanes that struck this country and the tidal wave that devastated countries in the Indian Ocean area. In 2006 this diocese gave only \$138,797.03. This is a half a million dollars less than the year before. Thankfully, there were fewer natural disasters last year. However, the work of ERD is more than just providing emergency relief.

Episcopal Relief and Development's long-term programs address the root causes of suffering disease, poverty, and chronic hunger. We focus on three areas: emergency relief and rebuilding, primary health care, and food security. Essentially, if people are unable to eat and aren't healthy, men and women cannot work and children can't attend school.

ERD's programs implement the Millennium Development Goals, or MDGs. The eight goals provide a blueprint for cutting extreme poverty in half by the year 2015. The Episcopal Church is committed to achieving the MDGs and ERD uses the MDGs as one measure of each program's success.

In 2007, we will work in 40 countries around the world. We are changing lives from the Gulf Coast of the United States to rural villages in the Philippines. This year, our programs will benefit close to 2 million people worldwide. So let's look in greater detail at our three areas of assistance.

Since 1980, natural disasters have killed over 2 million people and disrupted the lives of 820 million people.

- ◆ After a disaster strikes, ERD works with Episcopal, Anglican or ecumenical partners to provide life-saving assistance such as food, water, shelter, medicine and other essential supplies.
- ◆ Whether it's a hurricane, flood, war, or earthquake, ERD stands ready to meet the basic human needs of people left most vulnerable.
- ◆ Internationally, our rebuilding programs restore devastated areas by working with local communities to assess their needs and construct homes, schools, health clinics and water systems, as well as to train people to start small businesses.
- ◆ In the United States, we work with local Episcopal dioceses to develop a long-term rehabilitation program to address the needs of those who were impoverished prior to and as a result of the disaster.
- ◆ Specifically in the U.S., our Domestic Disaster Response and Preparedness Program grew out of a need to prepare churches and dioceses to respond to catastrophes, mainly natural and human-made in nature.
- ◆ Churches are often the first place many people turn for help after a crisis. In April 2006, Richard Ohlsen was hired to work with dioceses throughout the country to develop disaster preparedness plans.
- ◆ Episcopal churches need to be properly equipped to respond to local communities needs, quickly and effectively.

More than 10 million children die each year in the developing world from preventable illnesses.

ERD's primary health care programs:

- educate and train communities and local health workers on preventable illnesses and proper sanitation practices.
- provide people access to basic health care by supplying immunizations, medicine and treatment in vulnerable communities.
- build clean water systems and sanitation systems to ensure a safe water supply for drinking and bathing.
- protect people from contracting infectious diseases such as HIV/AIDS and malaria through training and prevention education as well as care for people directly impacted.

Malaria:

- ◇ Malaria is the leading cause of death in sub-Saharan Africa and is often called Africa's "silent killer." Malaria kills more than 1 million people annually.
- ◇ Worldwide, deaths caused by malaria are double the number of deaths caused by AIDS. Although malaria is preventable, it devastates communities, especially pregnant women and children under 5.
- ◇ ERD is expanding its malaria prevention and care programs. ERD is an implementing partner in NetsforLife: a partnership for malaria prevention in Africa.
- ◇ We plan to distribute at least 1 million long-lasting, insecticide-treated nets in 16 sub-Saharan African countries over the next three years.

Nearly 3 billion people live on less than \$2 a day.

ERD's food security programs:

- equip people with knowledge, skills, tools to ensure their families have enough food to eat year round.
- provide vocational training and micro-enterprise opportunities for people to create small businesses and expand sources of income.
- give families healthy animals and improved seeds which produce food and income.

REPORT OF CAMP AMAZING GRACE

Ms. Val Hymes , the Rev. Mimi Matthews and Ms. Linda Rines spoke on the ministry of this camp and presented a video showing Convention some of the wonderful work being accomplished.

The Prison Ministry Task Force, co-chaired by the Rev. Mimi Mathews and the Rev. Phebe McPherson, marked its second year of planning for Camp Amazing Grace for children of parents in prison.

Since the task force was created by this convention in 1998,

- We have focused on the death penalty with Sister Helen Prejean, author of *Dead Man Walking*;
- We have encouraged Prison Ministry Sundays during Epiphany or Lent

to shed light on ways to help the least of his return to society;

- We have started the Prison Ministry Network to share information about criminal justice reform and reentry issues endorsed by ours and Bishop Ihloff's resolution at General Convention;
- We created a Web site with resources, contacts, news, photographs and materials at www.prisonministry.ang-md.org
- We have worked successfully to return the right to vote to an estimated 50,000 Marylanders who have completed their sentences;
- We are working to help get the 2nd Chance Act through Congress; And we have started Camp Amazing Grace, hoping to challenge the statistics that say as many as 70 percent of those children will go to prison too.

Deacon Mimi Mathews, co-chair, noted, "When someone goes to prison, the family serves the sentence too."

There could be more than 9,000 of those children in Maryland. Some of their families belong to churches in this diocese. Does a week of camp help? Staff members in some of the camps now in 20 dioceses say it does make a difference and adds "hope" to a child's life.

Our maiden voyage last year was led by the Rev. Eddie Blue as camp director, Bill Ticknor as chaplain, Phebe McPherson as drama director, and many volunteers from St. James' and other parishes of the diocese. We could not have done it without invaluable help from Bishop Ihloff, the Bishop Claggett Center, the Development Office, Comptroller Karen Stewart, the Endowment Grants Committee, St. Margaret's Grants Committee, the Parish and Clergy Mailings, Ken and Dorris McElroy from several children's ministries, including Camp All God's Children, and so many more.

We could not have done it without your help.

This year's camp director, Linda Rines, is a former Girls Scout camper and counselor, a Red Cross volunteer, a Big Sister to three of last year's campers and a talented crafter.

She narrated a PowerPoint presentation of photographs from last year's camp with the Mission and Goals. "Our camp philosophy is to demonstrate unconditional love to campers who may never before have been offered or accepted that gift from their family, teachers or peers. For many of them, there has never been a gift given without something expected in return."

This year's camp will include Godly Play worship with Chaplains Phebe McPher-

son and Rosemary Beales. Wes Wubbenhorst will also serve as chaplain. She asked for prayers for the campers, their families and the volunteers from “parishes all around the diocese who have come together to share their time and talent in this most Amazing ministry.”

The secretary of convention reported that this completed all elections.

Bishop Rabb called upon the chairperson of the Mission Strategy Team to present the second of the theme presentations. The first piece of the presentation

was to receive information from the Search Committee.

The Rev. Richard A. Ginnever, co-chairperson of the Search Committee for the 14th Bishop of Maryland was invited to present to the Convention the results of the survey distributed throughout the diocese earlier in the year. Copies of the graphs of responses were distributed on the Convention tables and delegates were invited to share the information with their parishes.

REPORT OF THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

The Search Committee for the 14th Bishop of MD thanks the Mission Strategy Team for allowing us to begin this second presentation with a report on the work that has been accomplished to date. Having been charged by the Standing Committee of this diocese to begin our work in early February, and with the aid of a trained consultant, a chaplain and a budget, our group of 19 task-oriented individuals is well on its way.

Our purpose this morning is to let you know that we are listening to your voice and to many others, and with the goal of open and clear communication, within boundaries, we take the next few minutes to report on the dialogue and how communication can continue.

The Standing Committee authorized and distributed a survey that invited individuals, congregations, vestries and clergy to respond. This survey was due back in mid-February. Our committee's first work was to collect, tabulate and record all of the responses. To our surprise, the response was greater than expected. Nearly 60 percent of the congregations in this diocese sent in answers and comments, along with survey responses from 58 vestries, 68 clergy and six diocesan committees or ministries. The greatest response, of course, came from individuals – 3,500 in number. Each and every survey was recorded, tabulated and graphed.

The Search Committee received this data at its March meeting and each member of the committee has taken on the task of reading every comment. The information from the surveys that could be mathematically tabulated was presented in graph form, and I take a minute to share two with you now. Black and white copies are on each table, but the full color graphs are being shown on the screens, and the color copy will be available on the Bishop Search pages of the diocesan Web site by the end of the coming week. We wanted to share it with you first.

The first graph is entitled – **Desired Qualities in a Bishop**. Respondents were asked to list what they felt were the six most important out of the list of 15. The Search Committee has this information broken down into age

and gender categories, and to our amazement, they are remarkably similar. The graph is a source for much conversation, but may I remind you, that the graph indicates the percentage of people who felt that particular quality was among the highly desired, not what was most important, second most important, third most important and so on. In other words, the largest percentage of people (66%) thought that being a skillful manager of people and resources was a quality the new bishop should possess amongst others – but not necessarily the most important.

The second graph is entitled – **Priorities for the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Maryland**. This portion of the survey asked individuals to give each of the 21 possible priorities a high, moderate or low rating. The numbers at the bottom of the graph correspond to the priorities written out under them. The reading of the chart is as described in the right column. For each vertical bar on the graph, the bottom section in dark is the percentage of respondents who thought the priority was high, then the light area in the middle are those who felt it was moderate and finally, the top portion of each bar, also darker, was the percentage who felt it was of low priority. For example, priority number 10 – Strengthening existing congregations received – the largest percentage of individuals who thought it was of high priority – while priority number seven – establishing new congregations – received the lowest percentage who felt it was of high priority.

Please go the diocesan website www.ang-md.org and download the full color copy for your parishes. And use them to continue the dialogue. Of course, written comments cannot be collected, tabulated and reported in such an easy manner, but we have them and are reading each and every one of them.

The committee also recognized our need to hear additional voices from within our communities. Committee members have been meeting with regions, special ministries and focus groups. To date 31 such meetings have been scheduled and reports of comments and concerns shared with our profile Subcommittee. The questions asked in these meetings were also posted on the website as Supplemental Questions for all – again copies of all responses have been given to our Profile Committee. Six members of the committee are our profile subcommittee, and have been hard at work reading, listening and planning how we present ourselves to the greater church. I believe you will be excited and pleased when this profile is complete and printed. The Search Committee will work on the final draft next Saturday, with an expected completion date being the last day of this month.

The window for nominations is due to open on June 1. We will

be ready.

Our Education Committee presented a proposal to the fuller committee that included possible bulletin inserts, curriculum for adults and children, and the sharing of information about the process. The third handout on your table is our introduction to this endeavor.

A prayer for the Search Committee and process was written by a member of our committee, and has been posted on the website. We will be asking parishes to begin using the prayer in your worship. In conclusion, I ask the bishop's permission to share the prayer for the Search Committee with you now.

(Permission was received)

Let us pray.

Almighty God, whose gentle hands shaped the shores of the Chesapeake and molded the hills of the Alleghenies:

guide and direct your people

as we seek a chief pastor for the Diocese of Maryland.

Small table discussion followed this presentation with a recorder at each table whose notes were forwarded to the Mission Strategy Team and Bishop Search Committee following Convention.

Upon reconvening, the bishop called for the continuation of the report of the Resolutions Committee. Ms. Inez Haynie Dodson presented Resolution 2007 – 5 to Convention for consideration.

Resolution 2007-5

An Apology for Slavery

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, *confesses to God and to one another its complicity in its perpetuation of the sin of racism*, and apologizes for the Anglican Church in Colonial Maryland and of the Episcopal Church in the State of Maryland for their role in the slavery of African-Americans and in the subsequent racial injustice, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Task Force is asked to develop recommendations for the next step after this apology: that is, to find concrete steps the Diocese can take to repair the relations between races and to assist parishes as they continue this work.

The sponsoring Committee submitted the second Resolve and therefore it was accepted as a part of the original Resolution to be considered.

Following the defeat of a proposed amendment, a *friendly amendment* was accepted, and following discussion, the Question was Called.

The motion was adopted by voice vote

Upon the sharing of announcements by the dispatcher of business, Bishop Michel offered Grace for lunch.

After lunch, Convention reconvened, beginning with prayer. The first Order of Business for the afternoon was the continuation of the presentation of the Bishop's awards.

Convention rejoiced with all of the recipients and gave each a standing ovation.

The next order of business was the continuation of the report from the Resolutions Committee. Resolution 2007-6 was presented to Convention for consideration.

Maternity/Paternity Leave for Members of the Clergy

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, in accordance with Resolution C042 of the 73rd General Convention, direct the Compensation and Benefits Committee to develop and present a proposed Maternity/Paternity Leave Policy for clergy to Diocesan Council no later than October 1, 2007 for consideration; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Compensation and Benefits Committee incorporate any adopted policy into all appropriate compensation and benefits manuals; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention urges all congregations to incorporate this policy in letters of agreement with clergy.

Motion to refer to the Compensation & Benefits Committee of the Diocese passed by voice vote.

Resolution 2007-7 was presented to Convention for consideration.

RESOLUTION 2007-7

Continuing Conversation while Honoring the Process

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, strongly urges the bishops and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Maryland “*to exercise restraint by not consenting to the consecration of any candidate to the episcopate whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion...*” and by so doing, adhere to the letter and intent of 2006 General Convention resolution B033, as further clarified by the February 15, 2007 “Report of the Communion Sub-Group of the Anglican Communion.”

Following initial discussion, a Motion to Table was defeated by standing count.

A Substitute resolution was offered by the Rev. Bo Chapman:

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 4-5, 2007, strongly urges the bishops and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Maryland “*to seek and follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit in regard to Resolution B033 of the 2006 General Convention, as in all matters pertaining to their duties and responsibilities*”

Following discussion, the Substitute Resolution was accepted, and replaced the original.

The Resolution was passed by standing vote.

Resolution 2007-8 was presented to Convention for consideration.

RESOLUTION 2007-8

Diocesan Convention Costs in Annual Budget

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting

May 4-5, 2007, direct the Diocesan Council to include sufficient monies within each year's annual budget, beginning with the budget for 2008, to cover that portion of the cost of each year's Diocesan Convention attributed to renting space or building use fees.

Motion to refer Diocesan Council of the diocese was passed by voice vote.

Resolution 2007-9 was presented to Convention for consideration.

RESOLUTION 2007-9

Withdrawal from Iraq and Concern for Troops in Iraq and Afghanistan and their Families and for the People of Iraq and Afghanistan

Whereas the 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church meeting in Columbus, Ohio, adopted Resolution *D019: Pastoral Concern for Troops in Iraq and Afghanistan and their Families*, offering concern, prayer, and support for all serving in the military, particularly Iraq and Afghanistan; and *Resolution D020*, calling upon Congress and the President to develop a plan for stabilization of Iraq, followed by prompt withdrawal of U.S. Armed Forces in Iraq; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Diocese of Maryland, meeting in Convention May 4 - 5, 2007, accept and affirm Resolutions D019 and D020 of the 75th General Convention; encourage the president and the Congress to take proactive steps to end our participation, and fully fund all needed care and support for those who have served our country, *and be it further*

RESOLVED, that this Convention encourages the Diocese to seek meaningful ministries with those who are or have served in Afghanistan and/or Iraq, as well as all support personnel, and that the Faith and Public Policy Task Force be empowered to study and report recommendations to the Bishop on specific areas of ministry with military families.

Several friendly amendments were accepted including the addition of the second Resolve.

The Resolution was passed by voice vote.

Resolution 2007-10 was presented to Convention for consideration.

RESOLVED, that the 223rd Convention adopt the following new calculation for all congregational apportionments:

The apportionment will be the lesser of the following:

18 percent of the three year average Net Operating Income (NOI), parochial report line A, (e.g., years 2005, 2006, and 2007) less 4 percent of the prior year's Net Operating Expenses (NOE), line E, and less \$2,860.

or

18 percent of the prior year's Net Operating Income, parochial report line A, (e.g., 2007) less 4 percent of the prior year's net operating expenses, line E, and less \$2,860.

The Resolution was passed by standing acclamation, as is the custom of this diocese. The bishop instructed the secretary of convention to cast and record a unanimous ballot for the acceptance of Holy Trinity Church, Essex as a Separate Congregation.

ADDENDUM TO REPORT OF DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Financial Advisory Board oversees diocesan financial operations and makes recommendations to Council. Council has charge of receipts and disbursements provided for under the budget or by resolution of convention. Council acts as the convention between meetings on matters not specifically reserved for action of convention itself and performs the work committed to it by convention.

Council must vote on acceptance of the annual audit. This Council accepted the **2005 Audit**.

This year with particular interest we followed the ever changing **status of Diocesan land sales** – when, and what to do with the proceeds. Chariots of Fire Church is paying us \$1,000 monthly mortgage payments toward the purchase of Holy Cross, Millington. We anticipated sales of two other diocesan-owned properties. Annapolis Junction was sold, but the South Potomac Street sale fell through after many months of community sensitive postponements, necessitating a recent decision to auction the property later this month, projecting a 1.3 million dollar minimum. These sales will greatly reduce the diocesan debt carried for our construction loans.

Since last convention, Council approved the sale of the entire 11 acre Main Farm land in Frederick (often dubbed “the Walkersville property”). Since Council approved the original purchase in 2000, the value of the land much more than doubled. The fledgling start up congregation “The Gathering” could not in the near future build on the smaller portion of that property as originally planned. The decision to sell provided opportunity for us to discuss congregational development versus new church starts. The large land sale relieved the diocese of land purchase loan payments as well as the tax burden on the vacant land. We approved using proceeds from the sale to pay down diocesan debt while restricting 1.6 million from the sale for an interest bearing account designated as The Bishop Robert W. Ihloff Fund for Congregational Development. The Congregational Development Committee in conjunction with The Mission Strategy Team and the Financial Advisory Board must bring to Council a plan to implement the fund. As we learned from reports of The Urban Ministry Task Force there are many urban parishes struggling to make ends meet and this is the most urgent area of mission strategy now. The Ihloff Fund could provide one-time aid for specific needs to get struggling parishes over a hump, hopefully alleviating the run to appeal their diocesan apportionment. Fund recipients will not be eligible to appeal.

Appeals this year were far fewer than the usual – seven (7) this year as opposed to twenty-one (21) last year, and pledge payments came in on time for the most part, reducing the year-end deficit (\$127,000 this year as compared to 330,00 last year). Council’s convention resolution 12 is a revision in the apportionment formula that was used on a trial basis this past year. The results proved excellent. The revised formula encourages outreach and on-time payments off-setting the reduced apportionments. Lower budget allowance for appeals and fewer congregations making appeals benefit both diocese and parishes.

At each council meeting a representative of the **Bishop Claggett Center** reported on the center's operations and construction progress. Council approved the Bishop Claggett Center's 2007 operating budget.

The Claggett Construction Over-Site Committee, representing property, budget, Council and Claggett, reviews all the new construction invoices – from chairs to heating systems, and is committed to keeping the project within budget. At the Property Committee's request, Council voted to increase the capital budget for the project by \$250,000 due to additions in the scope of the project. Total anticipated spending is now \$4,900,000. While the books on Phase I of the construction are not closed, the building is in full use -- it is magnificent! The Financial Advisory board has indicated to Council that construction of an Adult Lodge can not begin until we have raised all the funds for Phase I. The development office continues working on many possibilities. Claggett, in the meantime, presented income projections and with Council's affirmation has commenced preliminary planning, using Claggett funds, for Phase II, the Adult Lodge.

Mission is a priority. This year we approved funding for three projects recommended by the new Global Mission Committee in response to the mandate from Convention to apportion 0.7 percent of its non-restricted annual budget to fulfill the Millennium Development Goals (MDG). A total of \$23,000 was set aside to support selected projects. One project provided water, food and teacher salaries for a preschool built by Maryland-based Ghanaian Mother's Hope in a village in the Diocese of Accra. The second project selected was a water purification system in Honduras in partnership with St. James' Parish, Monkton. The third grant goes to a medical mission in a impoverished area of Panama supported by the Frederick Region . Upon Council's request the Global Mission Committee formed an application timeline, a project selection criteria and followup reporting procedure.

The **Grants Committee** reviewed 27 applications for Diocesan Grants. Council engaged in discussion about their choices and decision making process and then approved their recommendation to fund six requests, four of which relate to Western Maryland. The \$32,873 available to distribute was a lot less than last year's \$78,000. Council also approved extending the \$20,000 yearly financial support of St. Mary's Outreach Center until June 2009.

Compensation and Benefits Committee is also a committee of Council.

Council approved their recommendation to switch from the self-managed Blue Cross/ Blue Shield to the dental plan offered by the Episcopal Church Medical trust. This is a justice issue. As has been done in the past three years, Council approved using the health insurance reserve fund to offset the health insurance premiums of diocesan lay retirees. The Church Pension Group subsidizes our retired clergy. This year the approval covered 18 months in order to put the insurance on a calendar year.

Convention resolution 2006-11 directed Council to find funding by October 2006 from non-diocesan sources for the impact on slavery on the Diocese of Maryland Project. While the Task Force on Reparations for Slavery had good intentions to get funding and in fact asked Council to find \$15,000 to fund the research work of the task. Council deals only with the diocesan budget and diocesan-funded programs and could merely act on the resolution by referring the issue to the Development Office to investigate interested foundations.

The balanced budget is definitely the map of our diocese's intended work. When some things become placeholders a change might be in order. Council approved Bishop Rabb's request to have the Development Commission develop a process for evaluating applicants for funding through the Bishop's Appeal.

Diocesan business is a balance of diligence and faith. We have benefited this past year from the faithful and diligent service of Susan Beares, the planning team chair, and Anne Gross, secretary. They tracked our canonical requirements, pithy financial statements, convention resolutions, and pending business.

Council is the face to face gathering that represents our elongated and peculiarly shaped diocese. The six meetings of Council between conventions are a unique opportunity to have representative voices from all corners of our diocese. Consistent attendance, especially from some areas of the Diocese, is a problem we would like to overcome. Clergy calls change from time to time creating changes in our roster. Council appoints replacement members for convention-elected position vacancies and regions are responsible for keeping their representation current. A June retreat will welcome the newly elected for 2007-2008 and forge the way ahead as a new combination of voices.

We bade farewell with a toast to Bishop Ihloff as he presided over his last

council meeting, February 17. Although our 21 elected members, the Bishop and other officers and ex-officio members bring different perspectives, theologies, and personalities we break bread together and do the work God has given us to do.

It has been an honor to serve with Bishop Ihloff and a council of such fine people.

Saint Mary's Outreach Center is growing with vision and purpose. Funded jointly by the diocese and St. David's Church, with a further grant from a St. David's parishioner, the center is beginning to come into its own. The first director, Melissa Timmerman, helped launch the Center and helped it take its first steps. Kris Lindh-Payne, who succeeded Melissa, worked hard to see that the center developed a clear focus for its ministry, and during this time the board agreed to make senior and substance abuse issues its two main targets. Present Director Sandy Simmons joined Kris last summer. They worked closely together to ensure a smooth transition.

Sandy's first task was to oversee a realignment of space within the Center so that all tenants would have a satisfactory and workable area in which to operate. Present tenants include St. David's Nearly New Shop, which quickly made a home for itself within the community and is flourishing. The Episcopal Housing Corporation has been a steady presence from the center's beginning, and Action in Maturity is our newest tenant. These offices benefit from frequent contact with each other and, in many ways, their areas of interest overlap. The Baltimore Shakespeare Festival is clearly our most theatrical tenant, and it has earned praise not only for its performances but also for its outreach into the community.

In addition to the full-time tenants, art classes are offered in the Great Hall, and Union Memorial Hospital holds regularly scheduled exercise classes for

seniors there as well. Social activities include four senior lunches a year, sponsored jointly by SMOC and AIM. Fifty people attended the December festivities! As part of another holiday activity 40 young people helped residents of 3838 Roland Avenue decorate their apartment doors, and then the young people toured the wondrous Hampden light displays. As director, Sandy keeps in close touch with the Hampden Family Center and other local agencies to make certain that our efforts complement each other. She regularly attends meetings of the Hampden Christian Fellowship as well as other neighborhood groups and has publicized the center in 'Hampden Happenings.'

At the heart of the center is the growing Resource and Referral Program. The Center is building a file of services available to local residents, what specific help each offers, and names and numbers of people to contact. In addition, the center arranges workshops and meetings on subjects of general interest. Recent emphasis has been on helping seniors navigate the Medicare prescription puzzle. Personnel from the State Commission on Aging and Retirement Education spent several days at St. Mary's helping our clients, and a doctor from the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy spent another day with us as well. She will return in the spring to offer a focus group for seniors who take multiple medications. Putting older citizens in touch with the Maryland Energy Assistance Program is often very helpful to them as well. In addition, Sandy and our Americorps intern hold many private interviews with elderly clients to help them pinpoint their needs and to direct them to appropriate agencies. The center is making good progress in strengthening its work with substance abuse issues as well, and expects that focus to parallel the growth of services to seniors.
