**Minutes of the Convention**

**Friday, May 1, 2009**

The 225<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of the Diocese of Maryland was held at the Marriott Hotel, Hunt Valley, Maryland, on May 1-2, 2009.

The Convention began with Opening Devotions led by the Rev. Meredith Olsen.

Following the devotions, the Right Rev. Eugene Taylor Sutton, bishop diocesan, called the Convention to order at 9:05 a.m.

In accordance with the Parliamentary Process set out for Convention, the Rev. William Smith, Chairman of the Committee on Right to Seats, reported that a quorum was present.

The Convention adopted the proposed agenda.

The Chairman of the Committee on the Right to Seats, The Rev. William L. Smith, presented a Courtesy Resolution to give Seat and Voice but not vote for Clergy living in the Diocese of Maryland, but not canonically resident. The resolution was carried by voice vote. The Chairman also reported that there were:  
131 Registered Lay Delegates present  
127 Registered Clergy Delegates present.

Following a welcome by the co-chairs of the Planning Team, Mr. Bill Lambert and the Rev. Joe Rushton, Bishop Sutton took a few moments away from the agenda to speak about the pandemic flu in this nation and precautions to be taken at Convention and guidelines for our parish churches.

The Bishop called for a report of the Nominating Committee, which was presented by the Rev. T. Stewart Lucas, Chair. Those nominees whose names were printed in the Pre-Convention Journal were placed in nomination, and the Bishop called for nominations from the floor for each of the offices. There were no further nominations from the floor.

The Bishop requested the Secretary of Convention to cast one unanimous ballot for those persons elected to office unopposed. They were:

Having received instructions on the voting process from the Secretary of Convention, the Convention delegates proceeded to vote. Upon the closure of the ballot boxes by the President, the Tellers of Election began the count.

The Rt. Rev. John L. Rabb gave his address:

**WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM MY FRIENDS**

Last year you heard my address through a recording. So why not try it again?

(A few verses from *I Get by with a Little Help from My Friends* by *The Beatles*)

Jesus in the 15<sup>th</sup> chapter of the Gospel of John calls his disciples *friends*. They are no longer called servants, even if this is the most often used title for the disciples, but friends. Not simply to be nice to one another or to raise the level of comradeship, but because for Jesus to be *a friend* is to be one who does what our Lord commands. We are called to be friends and we have been called to build up friendship as the Diocese of Maryland. The “sacred bundle” that I want to share with you today is that to build up the sacred friendship that our Lord demands of us is that we are formed in the fullness of Christian discipleship. My part of these addresses is to look at what we have been doing, and in particular what we are doing for the development of ministry, which is the work that friends are called to be about.

Formation for discipleship is life long and we are most fortunate to have had the excellent leadership and vision of the Rev. Amy Richter, Missioner for Lifelong Christian Formation. We just finished a wonderful diocesan wide Festival of

Christian Formation. Our vision is to have full formation, for all ages, in all of our churches. Your bishops earlier this spring met with the clergy and with two fine scholars, John Orens and James Thurrell to look not only at confirmation but at how it is part of the whole formation of the baptized people of God. I see more Christian formation in our churches, but wish to see even more! We never stop learning, for as St. Paul's says;

*But be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect (Romans 12:2)*

We cannot be transformed nor discern the will of God if we are not fully engaged in our formation. We must work at the holy friendship demanded by our Lord.

For the past nearly eleven years I have had as a major priority clergy leadership, both priest and deacon. While we often get anxious at the processes we have for discernment and for formation let me point to some results. We have consistently had in formation fully one quarter of our postulants as being under thirty years of age and/or persons of color. The effective deployment of our deacons and priests speaks to the fact that by good discernment, careful recruitment and screening and quality formation we can be sure that the deacons and priests serving our congregations are the best they can be.

Currently working with the Archdeacons, the Venerable Kerry Smith and the Venerable Lauren Welch, we are looking at a revived and strengthened deaconate. We simply need more deacons! The deaconate is a distinct, full and equal order. With the leadership of the Chair of our Board of Examining Chaplains, Dr. Steven Fowl, we have strengthened the curriculum. We are undertaking an in-depth and careful evaluation of the entire program and actively seeking more deacons. The archdeacons have been on visitations with both bishops to create more visibility and opportunities. This year I have forty-three congregations who wish deacons and only twenty six available, and this includes the two to be ordained in June. Why do we need more deacons? The most often repeated commandment our Lord gives us is "Whosoever will be first of all will be last of all and servant of all." The church by its essence is called to servant hood for all of God's people and we need servant leaders to symbolize, teach and lead the church to follow our Lord's call to servant hood.

We now have four Mutual Ministry teams: St. James, Westernport, St. John's, Frostburg, St. Peter's, Lonaconing and the churches of Garrett County. This process has been about ministry, and while we have used local discernment and formation for lay and ordained leadership, has seen growth in all of the churches as well as dynamic ministries. Notable are the Latino/Hispanic Ministry at St. James, the Canterbury House for university students at St. John's, Frostburg and the planned relocation of Our Father's House in order to reach people in north Garrett County.

We learned many things from this process and the idea of ministry teams was behind creating a four person team for west Baltimore. The Rev. Glenna Reed with two deacons, the Rev. Jane Mayrer and the Rev. Marshall Thompson, and a soon to be named other professional are serving Holy Nativity, Pimlico and St. Luke's, Carey Street. We will be looking at other models and ideas for ministry – urban, rural and suburban. The task is to be able to witness to the gospel in the most effective way possible.

We have had as an organized mission of the diocese for several years Los Tres Santos. I am pleased to say that they are now occupying the building once home to St. James' in Irvington. However, with the leadership of the Rev. Wes Wubbenhorst on the diocesan staff, a wonderful partnership with the Diocese of Honduras, the work of the Rev. Miguel Vilar and Hector Rodriguez, who will be received from the Roman Catholic Church this summer, we now have Spanish speaking services at St. James', Westernport, the Cathedral of the Incarnation, St. George's and St. Matthews' in Dundalk and soon at St. Mark's on-the-Hill in Pikesville. Hector is now our diocesan coordinator of Latino and Hispanic ministries. We envision more services in the coming year.

The Commission on Ministry, working especially with the Igbo speaking communities in our diocese and the Virginia Theological Seminary, is developing a process of formation for Igbo speaking ministries. The commission is also going to be looking at the Sudanese community meeting at St. Thomas, Towson. We are most pleased with the on-going ministry of Trinity Korean Episcopal Church and the leadership of the Rev. Paul Kim. The great increase in non-English speaking services in our diocese is one of the most significant outreaches we have done as well as building up new communities of faith – of friends.

I remain convinced that the church needs the strongest and best equipped leaders for mission. I noted earlier the good work in Christian formation. The Commission on Ministry, the Standing Committee and I continue to want to have the strongest formation for priestly formation. We also want to have formation that is mission directed and mission flexible. We continue to lead all dioceses in the church in ordained persons under the age of thirty-five. At the same time we have benefited greatly from the gifts and skills of priests of all ages.

A critical part of the pastoral ministry of your bishops and the diocese is to clergy families: spouses, partners and children. Last year at convention we launched FOCUS (Families of Clergy United in Support). We are all in grief over the death of our first convener, Barbara Smith. And we extend our sympathy to John, her entire family and St. Luke's. FOCUS is underway and has already had a retreat as well as other gatherings. A fund in Barbara's memory has been established to ensure that the good work of support for clergy families continues and that we honor the great legacy she left us.

Ministry development is all about the church moving forward in mission as we are called to do. I stated at the Lambeth Conference that we need to guard against “false” choices. It is a false choice to speak of having to choose between following the dictates of Matthew 25, that serving the least of all is to serve Christ himself, and the dictates of Matthew 28, that we go out into the world proclaiming the gospel and baptizing in the name of the Trinity. The gospel is never a multiple choice! It is both to serve and to evangelize! We need to be compassionate about the work of justice and we need to be about the work of evangelism. The Rev. Dr. Walter Brueggeman told the House of Bishops this spring that the Old Testament is always both about being holy and about doing justice, we cannot do one without the other. Too often we have set up false choices and divide ourselves against one another instead of standing firmly against the devil!

We are in difficult times. I want to say to you as I did to a protester at Lambeth who asked me what is going to happen to my church. Nothing. It is Christ’s church and not even the gates of hell can prevail against it. We need to realize this and start living and working as the church that Christ is counting on us to be. Also the difficult economic times require attention and good stewardship. But we are the Easter people – the earliest name given to the followers of Jesus. We are the people of hope because we know as Christ is Risen, God is in charge and God is making all things new! So let us go out and live and work as the people of Easter offering to the world true hope and true meaning.

The last thing a broken and contrite world needs is timid Christians, anxious and fearful. We need to show the world what it truly means to be “friends,” fully living out the faith and hope of our Lord. This is what the “sacred bundle” of ministry development is all about!

Finally it is much better to be speaking to you in person and not into a recorder in the intensive care unit. I cannot thank you all enough for all of your love and prayers as I regained my health. So how am I doing? Well I will let Paul, John, Ringo and George tell you.

The Bishop called upon the Chair of the Resolutions Committee, the Rev. Eddie M. Blue, to present the proposed resolutions.

## RESOLUTION 2009-1

**Title:       Right to Seats, Voice and Vote at Convention**

**RESOLVED**, that the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 1 and 2, 2009, amends the third sentence of Article 2 of the Constitution by adding the following underscored language:

Every member of the Clergy of this Church of whatever Order and wherever domiciled, whose canonical residence is within this Diocese and who has been recognized by the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese as a minister of some Parish or Separate Congregation within this Diocese, acknowledged as such by this Convention, or as a missionary under the direction of the Ecclesiastical Authority of this Diocese, or in another occupation approved by the Bishop, and every member of the Clergy of Churches in full communion with the Episcopal Church in the United States of America who is regularly serving a Parish or Separate Congregation of this Diocese, shall be entitled to a seat and vote in Convention, provided that no member of the Clergy having a seat in Convention shall lose the right thereto by reason of having ceased, on account of age or infirm health, to be engaged in any of the occupations aforesaid.

Following a motion and second to adopt, discussion ensued. A proposed “Friendly amendment” was not accepted as such and was then proposed as an amendment:

*Proposed Amendment* – To add the words “in a pastoral office” following the words “regularly serving.” Following discussion, the question being called on the amendment, the amendment failed by voice vote.

Consideration was directed to the original resolution, and upon voice vote, the motion to adopt was carried. The ruling of the President that the motion passed by voice vote was challenged, and upon a hand vote of the delegates, the ruling of the President was upheld.

***The motion to adopt Resolution 2009-1 in its printed form above passed.***

*It was noted that as a Constitutional Amendment, this Resolution needs to be approved at two consecutive Conventions. This is the first passage. It will be presented again at the 2010 Annual Convention.*

**RESOLUTION 2009-2**

**Title: Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation**

**RESOLVED**, that the Diocese of Maryland continue its commitment to being a living wage institution and, therefore, any employee of a congregation in the areas of Howard, Anne Arundel, or Baltimore Counties or Baltimore City be paid not less than \$11.30 per hour and employees in other areas of the diocese be paid not less than \$8.50 per hour, and that health benefits be available to any employee working at least 20 hours per week, and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that all clergy and lay employees be granted an annual review of performance that should consider merit increases in compensation as appropriate, and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the recommended annual salary increase for parochial clergy and congregational lay employees for 2010 shall be the total of a 0.1% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) on the 2009 salary plus any salary adjustment based on responsibilities and performance; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the annual compensation for parochial priests for 2010 be increased by an equity adjustment of 1.0% to continue the effort to increase the compensation of Diocese of Maryland clergy to at least the midpoint of compensation paid to clergy in similar dioceses; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that this Convention adopts the following Honoraria for supply clergy for 2010:

1 service	between \$75 and \$175
2 services	between \$100 and \$225
3 services	between \$150 and \$275
Guest Preacher	minimum of \$125
(Midweek services may be compensated at a lesser rate)	

and further directs that travel expenses be reimbursed in compliance with the Internal Revenue Service Guidelines; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that this Convention urges all congregations to provide fair, equitable, and competitive compensation to all persons providing program services such as, but not limited to, Director of Music, Choir Director, Director of Christian Education, and Director of Youth Programs; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that for transitional deacons and newly ordained priests for the first year following their ordination to the priesthood, the minimum annual Total Assessable Compensation (TAC) will be \$50,145; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the suggested range of TAC for experienced clergy who are hired as Assistant Rectors or Associate Rectors is \$53,900 to \$71,000; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that this Convention adopts the following TAC criteria for full-time clergy in charge of congregations within the Diocese for the year 2010. TAC for full-time clergy must be at least the minimum of the TAC range.

Information concerning appropriate compensation can be obtained from the diocesan office. Suggested salary ranges are available for the compensation of Church Organists and Choir Directors based on information from the American Guild of Organists and the Association of Anglican Musicians (AAM). Following a motion and second to adopt, discussion ensued. An amendment was offered to the first resolve: To request that the Compensations and Benefit Committee utilize the Penn State calculator of Living Wages in future reports.

After discussion of the amendment, the question being called, a voice vote was taken and the amendment failed

Consideration of the original resolution then ensued, and following discussion, the question was called.

***The motion to adopt this resolution as printed above carried by voice vote.***

Following a Break, Convention reconvened for the first of our Keynoter’s presentations. The Rev. Canon Charles Robertson, Canon to the Presiding Bishop invited the Convention to discover the “Sacred Bundles” of our life as a Diocese and as Parishes.

Immediately following announcements by the Dispatcher of Business, and Grace, the Convention adjourned for lunch.

Convention reconvened at 1:30 p.m., with devotions.

Bishop Sutton spoke to the Convention concerning the idea of Sacred Bundles and the Individual. He also spoke of the shared experience of Youth and the Annual Prayer Breakfast.

The Bishop called upon the Secretary of Convention to report on the results of the first ballot. The Rev. Richard A. Ginnever reported the following:

From 1984 until 1992, I had the privilege of serving a small, urban neighborhood parish in Boston. St. Luke's and St. Margaret's, or SLAM, as we were affectionately known, was located just off the Boston College Green Line at Packard's Corner, halfway between Boston University and Boston College. Since many people had no idea where Packard's Corner was, and there was a lot of territory between Boston University and Boston College, we were more easily found and thus identified as "that little church next to the Toyota Dealership on Brighton Avenue."

One sunny October day, when I had been at SLAM less than one month, I had to officiate at a funeral for a beloved parishioner who had hung onto her life until the new rector was ensconced. The cemetery in which she was buried was five miles from the church, and as was the custom, at least in Boston, I rode in the hearse with the funeral director, completely vested in cassock, surplice, tippet, and academic hood, which probably wasn't necessary but it was colorful and I didn't know any better. After the rather solemn committal, the funeral director drove me back to the church, and dropped me off at the corner. I hurried to the parish house door to take my vestments off in order to be on time for a lunch date with the Dean of Episcopal Divinity School, only to find the parish house tightly locked. I ran around the corner to the front door of the church, which was also locked. Then I ran over to the Rectory, which was serving as a group home, and

banged on the locked door as loudly as I could. None of the five individuals who lived there were home.

With no money, no phone, no keys, and only my Prayer Book in hand, I smoothed out my surplice, straightened my tippet, and walked across the street to the Toyota Dealership. Unfortunately, it was not a very busy day for the seven salesmen on the showroom floor, and they were each sitting at their desks scattered around various Tercel's and Camry's when I opened the door and walked in. Seven pairs of eyes looked up with some anticipation, and then froze as I did my best to look sober and sane. After at least 60 seconds of complete silence, one of the salesmen stood up and said, "Something tells me you're not here to buy a Toyota." I smiled and said, "No, but if you let me use your phone, I promise you the next car I buy will be a Toyota."

I called the Junior Warden who promised to be right over with keys to the building, and after thanking profusely the staff of the Toyota Dealership, I emerged onto the street just as the Dean was pulling up in his car. He got out with an ear-splitting grin and said to me, "Well, a new form of evangelism, I see. I can't wait to preach about this!" A new form of evangelism it turned out to be, as two of the seven salesmen actually did join the church, and I replaced my aging Ford Maverick with a Toyota Tercel Hatchback.

Evangelism - the sharing of the good news of Jesus, the Christ, is the life blood of the Church. And at the 76<sup>th</sup> General Convention of the Episcopal Church, to be held in Anaheim, California from July 8 to the 17<sup>th</sup>, evangelism will take the form of an exciting project called Public Narrative. Public Narrative is a leadership tool that encourages participants to get in touch with their own, authentic passions and motivations for mission. What is it about my own vocation that blows my hair back, that makes me want to engage with others, that sets my own heart on fire? This is called: the story of *self*.

The second part of Public Narrative is the story of *us*. Who are we as a community? How do we work together? What are our core values? That's pretty much the nature and essence of what we're doing at this convention and the next: engaging, sharing, and articulating the story of *us* as the Diocese of Maryland. As I learn to tell my own story, I need to be able to connect it to the story of *us*, to my community, to the Diocese of Maryland. What is the vocation, the call from God, that I and this community share, that we have in common?

The third part of Public Narrative is the story of *now*. The story of *now* is, perhaps obviously, not the story of *later*. There is urgency in the *now*, as well as a challenge and a choice. A practitioner of Public Narrative needs to be able to express the hope of a better future in such a way as to motivate others to take sometimes risky action. We need to be able to articulate why the action *matters*, and the outcome we hope to achieve.

When we tie it all together, when we link the story of self with the story of us and the story of now, an entire community can have a powerful tool for telling our public story, and moving the mission of the Church forward. And what is the mission of the Church? *The mission of the Church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.* (BCP, p.855)

I share all of this with you because Public Narrative can be a way to articulate *Ubuntu* - an African concept made popular by Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the theme of General Convention. In Archbishop Tutu's words, *a person is a person through other people*, or, *I am what I am because of who we all are*, or, *me/we*. In John's Gospel, Jesus says *I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you.* (John 14:18-20)

Your Deputation to General Convention is going to Anaheim not simply to wrestle with the budget, address issues of doing justice and alleviating poverty, worship, pray, and attend countless meetings and hearings and meals. We're not going to Anaheim just to talk about the Anglican Covenant, and promote Anglican Partnerships, and claim our identity as Christians in an increasingly multi-cultural and pluralistic world. We will do all of that, God willing. But we are also going to Anaheim to intentionally engage with hundreds of others in *Ubuntu*, in articulating the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ, which is the mission and ministry of the Church. We are going to Anaheim to listen, to learn, and to grow, for the sake of Christ. And we are going to Anaheim to share our stories: the story of *self*, the story of *us*, and the story of *now*, so that in so doing, we can all be agents for the reconciliation of the world to God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

We ask for your prayers. And we offer our profound gratitude for the privilege of serving the Diocese of Maryland as Deputies to General Convention.

## **TREASURER'S REPORT**

Good Afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen. I am Doug Vaughan, the Diocesan Treasurer. Before I review our financial position for 2008 I would like to say thank you to all people participating in our ministry.

First, I also want to thank all congregations that paid their diocesan allocation on or before December 31, 2008. Participating in this fashion allows us to, collectively, bring God's ministry forward across the world.

Next, I would like to thank those congregations who sent in their 2008 parochial reports on or before the March 1<sup>st</sup> deadline. Although completing a parochial report is not always a pleasant experience, it is required and we appreciate your support in this process.

Our shared ministry reflects the fact that the diocese of Maryland is not located only at 4 E. University Parkway, but is comprised of members of all our congregations throughout the State of Maryland. Together we are one in the Body of Christ.

In that light, I would like to thank all the volunteers who served on all our committees including the Financial Advisory Board, Program and Budget Committee, and the Investment Committee. As I am sure most of you would agree, economic conditions add a new level of challenges to volunteers tasked with the financial management of our Diocese. The task of fiscal responsibility is intense and time consuming. I just want everyone to know that we could not manage this without the help of all members.

### **Now for the 2008 financial highlights:**

Our annual audit for 2008 is complete! The audit of our financial statements was complete on March 26, 2009 by the auditing firm, Gross Mendelsohn. We received a clean audit opinion. Our audited financial statements are available on our website under "Parish Resources", I wish to thank Karen Stewart, Comptroller/Assistant Treasurer, and the Business Office staff for their hard work and long hours invested in this task while continuing their normal day-to-day operations of congregational and diocesan program support. She has also requested that I remind you that the Diocesan Business Office is a shared resource for each congregation. So please feel free to call her if you have any questions or concerns. Transparency of financial activities is very important because this is our diocese and we all have a part in ensuring stewardship and ministry fulfillment.

**Here are a few highlights from 2008:**

1. Congregational allocations made up 76% of our total cash received in 2008.
2. We withdrew money from our investments to support our ministry. In 2008 we used the ratio of 5% of the three year rolling average of our unrestricted investments for use in our ministry. In 2008 this amount totaled \$520,000. This withdrawal made up 2% of our total cash received in 2008. Our 2009 budget contains \$547,000 or 4.5% of the three year average investment balance as of 12/31/2007.
3. The remaining 24% of income came from restricted funds either raised for Diocesan programs through the Bishop's Appeal or drawn from our endowments and investments.
4. We utilized our funds efficiently, while spending only 4% of the revenue for administration and fund raising, leaving 96% of our funds to be spent on direct ministry. A few of the ministries paid for by your allocations are:

Congregational Financial Assistance  
Campus Ministries (on five college campuses)  
Copley Kids (after school program at Copley Parish)  
Camp Excel (a summer camp at Holy Covenant Church)  
Rainbow Camp (an overnight camp for children affected by HIV and/or  
AIDS)  
Camp Amazing Grace (an overnight camp for children of incarcerated  
parents)  
Seminarian and Post-Ordination Support  
Urban Ministries  
Western Maryland Outreach  
Other Grants for ministry

5. In 2008, eighteen cents of every dollar contributed through your allocations were sent to Domestic Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS). We sent \$551,900 to aid in ministries around the U.S. and the world.

**Now let me spotlight other financial facts:**

By Canon, we are charged with presenting a balanced budget. Our budget is brought into balance by authorizing only the amount of expenses covered by anticipated revenue or cash due in throughout the year. We had a short-fall in revenue of approximately \$132,000 in 2008. We were able to adjust our spending throughout the year thus reducing our budget short-fall from \$132,000 to \$32,000.

### **Investments**

As I am sure we are all aware, 2008 was a turbulent time in the stock market. I know many of us have seen negative numbers on our portfolio statements. We are not exempt from the pain that was felt across the land. The value of our portfolio declined by \$10 million in the early days of October but it regained some of it's wealth by settling the year with a \$6.1 million devaluation as of December 31, 2008. As of the March 31, 2009, however, we have seen a stabilizing affect on our investment balance. We continue to monitor the balance of our total portfolio, and the Investment Committee responds as needed to ensure our risks are minimized.

### **The year ahead...**

In conclusion, although we face financial challenges throughout the diocese I believe 2009 has started out in a positive way with good communication and shared resources within our Diocese. It is clear to me that we are one church with one focus on partnering with mission and ministry.

Although we are collectively facing financial challenges, we are continuing to encourage and follow good stewardship practices utilizing all funds raised to benefit ministry and missions of our church in the Diocese of Maryland, the United States, and the World.

We look forward to another year in service for God, our Diocese, and the world.

### **RESOLUTION 2009-3**

**Title: Amendment to Article 2, Paragraph 2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Maryland**

**RESOLVED**, that the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 1-2, 2009 deletes the underscored section of the following section of Article 2 paragraph 2 of its Constitution

*The number of lay delegates shall be determined in accordance with the following table: (a) Churches with 400 or fewer communicants, one delegate, and (b) those with more than 400 communicants, one additional delegate for every additional 400 increment of communicants or fraction of that number. For purposes of this paragraph of this Article the number of a Church's communicants shall be that stated in its latest parochial report filed with the Bishop. "Communicants" are members of the Church who have **been confirmed and who have received Holy Communion in the Church at least three times in the previous year.***

And replaces it with:

“received Holy Communion at least three times during the preceding year and are faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and in working, praying and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God.”

Following a motion and second to adopt, discussion ensued.

A Friendly Amendment was proposed by not accepted by the submitters of the resolution. Therefore, an amendment was proposed:

*Proposed Amendment* - to add the words, “baptized, sixteen years of age” following the words – Communicants are members of the Church...

The Proposed Amendment failed by voice vote.

***Following the question being called, the resolution was passed by voice vote.***

Therefore, (If passed as is at the 2010 Convention), Article 2 paragraph 2 of the Constitution will read:

*“The number of lay delegates shall be determined in accordance with the following table: (a) Churches with 400 or fewer communicants, one delegate, and*

*(b) those with more than 400 communicants, one additional delegate for every additional 400 increment of communicants or fraction of that number. For purposes of this paragraph of this Article the number of a Church's communicants shall be that stated in its latest parochial report filed with the Bishop. "Communicants" are members of the Church who received Holy Communion at least three times during the preceding year and are faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and in working, praying and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God."*

NOTE – As a Constitutional Amendment, this Resolution needs to be approved at two consecutive Conventions, and this is the first passage. It will be presented again in 2010.

#### **RESOLUTION 2009-4**

**Title: Amendment to Article 2, Paragraph 2 of the  
Constitution of the Diocese of Maryland**

**RESOLVED**, that the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 1-2, 2009 repeals the underlined and bold parts of the following section of Article 2 paragraph 2 of its Constitution

***The number of lay delegates shall be determined in accordance with the following table: (a) Churches with 400 or fewer communicants, one delegate, and (b) those with more than 400 communicants, one additional delegate for every additional 400 increment of communicants or fraction of that number. For purposes of this paragraph of this Article the number of a Church's communicants shall be that stated in its latest parochial report filed with the Bishop.***

and replaces it with:

*The number of lay delegates shall be determined in the following manner:*

At least one lay delegate from each Church, who shall be at least sixteen years of age and a communicant in good standing of the Church in which he or she is chosen. In addition to the one lay delegate authorized under this article, a Church shall be entitled to no more than four additional Lay Delegates determined as follows:

*(i) By October 1 of each year, the Secretary of Convention shall average the Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) as reported in the parochial report of each*



## RESOLUTION 2009-6

**Title:           Prison Ministry Sundays**

**RESOLVED**, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland will encourage all parishes to celebrate and hold a Prison Ministry Sunday each year, making available appropriate Prayers of the People; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland will encourage parishes to seek out and structure partnerships with people in prison and their families, those who work or volunteer in the prison system and help ex-offenders return to society in productive ways by working with and encouraging re-entry programs; and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that the Secretary of Convention forward a copy of this resolution to the appropriate committee of General Convention 2009.

*Following a motion and second to adopt, discussion ensued. The question being called, the motion to adopt the resolution as printed above passed unanimously.*

Bishop Sutton took a few moments to speak of some norms during the annual visitations to parishes, including that the Parish Register and Service Book Register being made available for the review by the bishops.

## RESOLUTION 2009-7

**Title:           Liturgical Commemoration of Justice Thurgood Marshall**

**RESOLVED**, that the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 1-2, 2009 reaffirms its support for the liturgical commemoration of the life and ministry of Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall on May 17<sup>th</sup> as a way to celebrate the relatively peaceful end to legal racial segregation and the improvement of relations between Americans of various colors, and be it further

**RESOLVED**, that this Convention urges all parishes and congregations to join in diocesan commemorations and to find local ways to remember and highlight Marshall's contributions to a more just society.

Following a motion and second to adopt, discussion ensued, especially

concerning the need for this resolution in light of the Resolutions Committee's report. The question was called.

*The motion to adopt the resolution, as printed above, passed by voice vote*

### **RESOLUTION 2009-8**

**Title:        Date of Annual Convention**

RESOLVED, that the 225<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Maryland, meeting May 1-2, 2009, amends Canon 1-200 to read as follows: [language to be deleted from existing canon shown (in parenthesis)]

The annual meeting of the Convention shall be held on such date (within the month of May) of each year at such place as may be fixed by the Bishop with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee.

Following discussion, and the opportunity for questions, an amendment was proposed:

*Proposed Amendment* – To insert – as may be fixed, “no later than 12 months in advance,” by the Bishop with the advice...

Upon the vote on the amendment being called, the pages assisted in the counting of the delegates vote. The amendment failed by a vote of 136 in favor and 144 opposed.

**The original motion was then passed by voice vote and the Canon now reads:**

*The annual meeting of the Convention shall be held on such date of each year at such place as may be fixed by the Bishop with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee.*

\* \* \* \*

Immediately following a series of announcements, and a review of pastoral concerns and prayer requests from Bishop Rabb, the Convention recessed until Saturday morning, concluding the afternoon with Evening Prayer at 4:15pm.

A time of fellowship preceded the Convention Banquet. At the Banquet, a series of presentations celebrations, thank-yous, and appointments. were made as well as an introduction of the Seminarians.

The Bishops' Awards for *Distinguished Baptismal Ministry* were presented to:

The banquet was closed with the praying of the service of Compline, led by the Youth of the Diocese.

### **Saturday, May 2, 2009**

The morning began at 9:00 a.m. with the celebration of the Convention Eucharist, with Bishop Sutton as Celebrant and the Rev. Canon Charles Robertson as preacher.

Following the Eucharist, Convention broke for coffee and reconvened at 10:55 a. m. Bishop Sutton called upon the Secretary of Convention to report on the results of the second ballot. The Rev. Richard A. Ginnever reported the following:

The Secretary reported that this concluded all elections. The Bishop called for the presentation of the First Annual Peeps Awards, presented by the Rev. Amy Richter and Sharon Tillman. The winners were

At 11:15 a.m., the Rev. Canon Charles Robertson presented his second keynote address.

Immediately following the keynote address, Bishop Rabb took a few moments to introduce the clergy who were new to the diocese since the last Convention.

Announcements were made and Convention, after Grace, recessed for lunch at 12:10 p.m.

At 1:20 p.m., Convention reconvened with prayer. The first order of business was the introduction of Ms. Sonya Sutton wife of Bishop Sutton, to the Convention, who was greeted with tremendous applause and smiles.

Ms. Kate Schaeffler was introduced to the Convention, and given time to speak about her upcoming year serving as a Youth Mission Volunteer. Convention not only received her with a joyous response, but also urged members to support her endeavors through donations.

There was a correction made to the original list of appointments offered on Friday by the Bishop.

With all other items of business being completed, the Rt. Rev. Eugene Taylor Sutton offered the Bishop Diocesan's annual address:

### **BUILDING UPON A SURE FOUNDATION**

The Rt. Rev. Eugene Taylor Sutton

I was trained, groomed and prepared to become a bishop in the Episcopal Church by the Baptists...Mt. Bethel Baptist Church in Washington, DC. There I was raised in the Christian faith of my African American ancestors and forebears – which meant I sang, clapped, shouted, stomped and “Amen-ed!” my way into following Jesus. By high school, however, I had fallen away from the church.

And then, on March 29 of last year, my life changed again...oh, what a year it's been. Sonya and I have fallen in love all over again...only with you! You've incorporated us into your family, and I've driven about 10,000 miles visiting you all since last summer – in the hybrid car you've provided for the “green bishop”, of course!

Why do I love the Diocese of Maryland? Because of you, its people! I am, however, reminded of what the late Herb Thompson of blessed memory – he was the bishop of Southern Ohio – who once told me about a young man, fresh out of college who went to see his bishop about possibly becoming a priest. “Why do you want to become a priest, young man?” the bishop asked. The young man responded, “Because I love people, Bishop...I want to serve them, I get my

energy from being with them, and I just love everything about people.” The bishop looked at him and said, “Young man, have you seen the people?”

This is a great diocese, based on many factors:

- The many Episcopalians I’ve met who are leaders in our cities and towns.
- Our commitment to addressing important societal issues, such as racial justice and the environmental crisis, in light of the gospel of reconciliation through Christ.
- Our continuing commitment congregational ministry in diverse languages and cultures, including Korean, Igbo and Latino ministry.
- Our high quality Episcopal schools and educational ministries. As you know, I have called for the diocese to explore and establish a new Episcopal school in the city of Baltimore specifically for the poor, and I’m very gratified that about 20 persons throughout the State have agreed to serve on a Working Group to study the feasibility of starting this new ministry. This short-term task force is in the middle of its work, and they will issue their report to me this summer, suggesting next steps for us to consider in the fall of this year.
- The large number of outreach ministries and related institutions in our Episcopal family, i.e. Episcopal Community Services of Maryland, Episcopal Ministries to the Aging, St. Mary’s Outreach Center, Episcopal Housing Corporation, Baltimore International Seafarer’s Center, Prison Ministry, Camp Amazing Grace, Rainbow Camp, Harford House, ERICA (Episcopal Refugee & Immigration Center Alliance), Joseph Richey House (the only hospice for adults in the city of Baltimore), the Corporation for the Relief of Widows and Children of Clergy.
- Our renewal, retreat and fellowship ministries, e.g. Claggett Conference Center, Maryland Episcopal Cursillo, Church Club of Maryland, Daughters of the King, Brotherhood of St. Andrew (of which I am now a life member and chaplain).
- Our diocesan Public Policy Office has been formed by our Director of Public Affairs, Jack Pannell. He works closely with a very dedicated public policy working group that includes Don Schroeder, the Bishop’s Deputy for Public Policy, Rev. Deacon Madeleine Beard and The Ven. Archdeacon, Lauren Welch. During the session of the Maryland legislature, the diocese helps fund a legislative advocacy office in Annapolis. We are the lead diocese in supervising and supporting this office, but have also now been promised some support from the Diocese of Easton and the Diocese of Washington for this important ministry. Also, we applaud the work of our newly named Jubilee Officer, the Rev. Deacon Madeleine Beard.
- Our reputation nationally in the Episcopal Church...besides the

significant work we're known for in anti-racism and the environment that you learned of last night, here are a few more measures of it: Bishop Rabb's recognized leadership in the Episcopal Church in theological education, urban ministry and health ministry...We are one of the few dioceses that employ an Archivist, and we have been recognized as housing one of the best archives in the national church...And, because of our diocesan youth ministry, we had over 125 of our youth from 25 parishes attend the Nightwatch in NYC; 24 youth took part in Maryland Happening #1 at Claggett; we had the largest diocesan contingent of youth attending the national Episcopal Youth Event last year, and in the past dozen years almost 400 of our youth have taken mission trips to Honduras and Appalachia – and these are life-changing experiences! Globally, our commitment to the Millenium Development Goals, taking seriously the call for all churches and dioceses to commit 0.7% of its income to eradicate extreme poverty. Also, our commitment to global mission; yes, this convention marks the end of our companion diocese relationship with the Diocese of Accra which has run its natural course, but the beginning of a new era of global mission links with several dioceses in the Anglican Communion. I've called on Izzie Winn and James Blue, in consultation with staff person Canon Mary Glasspool, to begin forming with others a new diocesan Global Mission Links Committee to guide these efforts, and report back to the next year's convention.

- The diocesan staff, many of whom serve nationally on various boards and agencies of the Episcopal Church, cement our reputation as one of the very best dioceses in the Anglican Communion.

We have been blessed to be in a diocese firmly built upon a sure foundation – its bishops, priests, deacons, staff, lay leaders, parishes, ministries and missions. Our sacred bundles are sound. The question before us now, though, is what do we do to build on the foundation we've inherited?

*“Everyone who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock. The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock.” (Matthew 7:24-25)*

As most of the clergy of the Diocese of Maryland know by now, in my office on the ledge near my desk, there are five large rocks on display by the window. Why, some of them have asked, do I have a bunch of rocks in my office? Well, here's why: because I believe that the key to happiness in life is for one to build one's life and ministry upon a sure foundation – solid as a rock. And I know that if I am to be granted the spiritual authority by you to become your bishop not because of my title but because I've earned it, then it will be because I have

identified and paid attention to the “rocks” of my ministry here, building upon a sure foundation. Let me explain.

I assume that many of you have heard of a now famous story by Stephen Covey, the noted writer and teacher on effective management, author of the bestseller *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*. In his more recent book, *First Things First*, Covey describes what one of his associates experienced in a seminar. In the middle of the lecture the presenter pulled out a wide-mouth jar and placed it on the table, aside to some fist-sized rocks. After filling the jar to the top with rocks he asked, “Is the jar full?”

People could see that no more rocks would fit, so they replied, “Yes!” “Not so fast,” he cautioned. He then got some gravel from under the table and added it to the jar, filling the spaces between the rocks. Again, he asked, “Is the jar full?”

This time the students replied “Probably not.” The presenter then reached a bucket of sand below the table, and dumped it on the jar, filling the spaces between the rocks and the gravel. Once again he asked “Is the jar full?”

“No!”, the students shouted. Finally, he grabbed a pitcher of water and filled the jar completely, and then asked them what they could learn from that illustration. One of the participants answered, “If you work at it, you can always fit more into your life.”

“No,” said the presenter. “The point is, if you don’t put the big rocks in first, you will never get them in!”

Of course, that story can be applied to all aspects of our life, and most importantly, to our ministry together. As you know, last fall I published the five priorities that I’ve wanted to accomplish in my first two years as Bishop of Maryland. I want to share them again with you:

1. Get acquainted with diocesan people, programs and procedures.
2. Earn trust.
3. Maintain spiritual grounding.
4. Expand mission links within the Anglican Communion.
5. Strengthen the civic role of the office of Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland (including exploring programmatic initiatives in education and the environment).

These priorities have been my “rocks” of office in the past year, guiding my and my staff’s decisions about calendar questions. But what are our diocesan rocks? What’s in our jar in Maryland? Unless we spend some time discerning as a diocese what we want to become and how we propose to get there, then we may

continue to do a lot of good things, but we will never achieve great things for the sake of the gospel. We simply will never get the Big Rocks in.

That leads us to this point: as a diocese, we need to focus this year on discerning what our Big Rocks will be. Why? Because we are followers of Jesus Christ, and Christians are always building! To keep doing the same things, without being open to the Holy Spirit's leading us into the "new", means that we will stagnate as a diocese. Not to grow, in Christian terms, means diminishment, and I will not be a leader of an institution in decline. As your bishop, I want to assure you of this right now: we are going to grow, and we are going to plan for that growth right now!

Therefore, at this convention I call for the Diocese of Maryland to embark upon a new journey for the next twelve months to imagine, focus on and enact a new vision for what are going to accomplish as a diocese. I call for us to dream big dreams, and then discern which of those dreams we will choose to direct the bulk of our energies and resources. I propose that we leave a legacy for future generations that will make a difference in their lives, in the church and in the world. And this new vision does not mean that we will disregard the past, tossing out everything old. On the contrary, we will take special care to return to and draw upon our diocesan history and traditions, be guided by our received "sacred bundle", and learn from our past mistakes as well as past successes.

The Mission Strategy Group, a committee of the Diocesan Council instituted many years ago to keep the diocese true to its stated goals - "the Five Directions" - has worked diligently since last summer to design a course of action for the diocese as a whole to engage in a new visioning process. Here is a summary of the process that we will undertake:

1. The key to the process is the formation of a broad-based "Horizons Gathering" whose charge is to discern new Vision and Mission priorities for the diocese.
2. In order to achieve widespread participation, we request that every parish, mission and institution in the diocese send one person to serve on the HG. We specifically ask that this representative be a lay person, chosen in any way that the church or institution desires. The Bishops, with an eye toward diversity and balance, will appoint other clergy and laypersons to serve in the process as well. We are looking for prayerful people who can work with others in a discernment process that results in shared priorities. It is envisioned that the total number of people serving on the Horizons Gathering will be about 150 persons.
3. The Horizons Gathering will have two separate all-day meetings at the Bishop Claggett Center: Saturday, October 3, 2009 and Saturday, February 27, 2010.

4. The Rev. Dr. Chuck Robertson, Canon to the Presiding Bishop, will facilitate the Horizons Gatherings, and the Mission Strategy Group will serve as the steering committee for the entire visioning process. The Bishop Diocesan will have a crucial role in both articulating his mission priorities as well as synthesizing what he hears from the HG.
5. The MSG will prepare a report for diocesan convention in 2010, summarizing the work of the Horizons Gathering, and presenting new Vision and Mission priorities to the 226th Convention of the Diocese of Maryland for ratification.

As you can see, the Diocese of Maryland is on the move. We are building upon a sure foundation of faithful ministry for 325 years in this beautiful land on the eastern seaboard in this great country. We are in continuity with our past, and we are confidently facing our future. We are reminded of the words of St. Paul:

*“I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors...all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ.” (I Corinthians 10:1,3-4)*

Jesus is the Rock...He is our sure foundation...the first-born of all creation, the head of the church, and the author of our salvation. It is to Christ our Rock that we live, and move, and have our being. Let us proclaim Christ with boldness, confidence and exuberance as we move into a new day in the Diocese of Maryland.

Finally, I want to conclude by repeating the statement that I gave to the diocese on March 29 of last year, accepting my election as the 14th Bishop of Maryland:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am both honored and humbled to be elected your bishop in the wonderful Diocese of Maryland. I and Sonya look forward to being among you as fellow travelers in this exciting journey!

I would like to express my hopes and dreams for our new ministry together in the form of a prayer. We continually give thanks to God, who in Christ makes “a new creation...the old has passed away, behold, all things have become new.” In gratitude let us pray for God’s guidance for a blessed future; let us pray:

*O Lord our God, look with favor upon your pilgrim people in the Diocese of Maryland. Help our bishops, priests, deacons and lay ministers lead lives worthy of the calling to which we have been called, with all humility, gentleness, and patience. May our life together be infused by the grace of truth and the spirit of*

*reconciliation; in times of celebration may we freely rejoice, and in times of distress may we listen to and forgive one another in love, always eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. Open our hearts to receive the Living Christ in our midst; may we never tire to seek him in prayer and action, and in works of mercy and justice throughout the world. This we pray in the name of Jesus our Savior, Amen.*

\* \* \* \*

Members of the diocesan staff were individually introduced and greeted by Convention with appreciation and applause.

With no other business before the Convention, Bishop Sutton called upon the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee to offer our Courtesy resolutions.

## **PRISON MINISTRY TASK FORCE REPORT**

The Prison Ministry Task Force, created by Convention resolution in 1998, has focused its work in the past year on three fronts: advocating for criminal justice reform in Congress and the Maryland legislature; Camp Amazing Grace for children of the incarcerated; and in working with lifers for citizenship programs inside prisons.

**General Convention:** Most recently, despite the huge workload of 385 resolutions facing them at General Convention, the bishops and deputies of the diocese won the successful passage of three resolutions proposed by the Prison Ministry Task Force, although one was amended.

B021 urges Episcopalians to press their legislators and members of Congress to ensure that prisoners have “broad access” to DNA testing. It was sponsored by Bishop John L. Rabb, Bishop John B. Chane of Washington and Bishop James J. “Bud” Shand of the Diocese of Easton. Passage permits the church’s Government Relations Office to lobby for appropriate legislation.

C075 includes \$75,000 in the budget for the creation and support of more summer camps like Camp Amazing Grace for children of the incarcerated. It was sponsored by the diocese, having been approved at the May Convention.

D095 calls for a Prison Ministry Sunday in all dioceses and congregations, but was amended to ask that they “focus on ways to minister to God’s children behind bars, those returning to the community, and their families and victims.” The title, however, remains “Prison Ministry Sunday.” Sponsors were the Rev. Angela Shepherd, St. Philip’s, Annapolis; the Rev. Scott Bellows, St. David’s, Baltimore; and Russell “Ronnie” Reno Jr., Church of the Redeemer, Baltimore.

**In Annapolis:** The Task Force also worked for the repeal of the death penalty with Bishop Sutton, Don Schroeder, bishops’ deputy for public policy, and the Rev. Madeleine Beard, Maryland Episcopal Public Policy Network, at the Maryland legislature..

**On Capitol Hill,** the Task Force continues to work for funding of the Second Chance Act, for a 40-Hour Work Week for inmates,, and for a national commission charged with reforming the criminal justice system.

**Camp Amazing Grace** 2009 marked its fourth year June 28-July 3 with new experiences, more skilled staff members and more representation from the parishes that support it.

Although 26 campers were invited, only 23 were able to attend. Their parents are in state women's and men's prisons and in two federal institutions. One child, cared for by a grandfather, has both parents in prison.

The staff team was led by Will Pass, director, Rick Conover, staff director and Holly Pass, program director. Deacon Patrick Arey, 2008 director, served in an advisory role. Parishioners from a dozen churches came to offer special services, including a history walk to a slave cemetery. The theme, "Yes I Can," was spelled out in lessons about civility throughout the week.

**Community Support Coalition:** The Task Force continues to work with a group of lifers and long-termers who have developed programs inside state facilities such as Legal Awareness Seminars, a Gang Peace Initiative, and the Merit-Based Movement to earn parole consideration.

**Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

The Mission of the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland (the Diocese) is to carry forward God's reconciling work through Jesus Christ as they build up the Body of Christ, strengthen one another for Christ's mission and strive for justice and peace within the Church and the world within Maryland. The major forms of support come from contributions and bequests from the congregations.

The major programs of the Diocese are as follows:

Claggett Conference Center: The Bishop Claggett Center is a farm and conference center located in Frederick, Maryland. The Center is available to church, school and special interest groups for the purpose of spiritual growth, recreation and education.

Nation and World: Nation and World expenditures encompass the Diocesan involvement in the work of the Episcopal Church beyond the Diocese of Maryland.

Ordained Ministry: Ordained Ministry expenditures encompass expenses related to the theological education and the support of clergy.

Lay Ministry: Lay Ministry expenditures encompass expenses related to Christian education and programs that support Lay leadership development.

Congregation Development: Congregation development expenditures encompass grants and other support for individual congregations, which are significantly funded by the Diocese.

Social Ministry: Social Ministry expenditures encompass grants to congregations for outreach programs.

The accounting and reporting policies of the Diocese conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Following is a description of the most significant of those policies:

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of Presentation: The Diocese prepares its financial statements in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, *Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations*. SFAS No. 117 requires that the Organization report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

Unrestricted net assets are neither permanently restricted nor temporarily restricted by donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily restricted net assets result from contributions whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that either expire by passage of time or can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the organization pursuant to those stipulations. Net assets may be temporarily restricted for various purposes, such as use in the future period or use for specified purposes.

Permanently restricted net assets result from contributions whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by the organization's actions.

Cash and Cash Equivalents: The Diocese classifies all investments which are readily convertible to cash and which have a maturity of three months or less when purchased as cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents classified as investments are not considered cash and cash equivalents for cash flow purposes.

Pledges Receivable: Unconditional promises to give are recorded as pledges receivable and recognized as revenues in the period received. In accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, *Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*, unconditional promises to give in a future period are discounted to their net present value at the time the revenue is recorded. A provision is made for uncollectible pledges based on anticipated collection losses. Estimated losses are generally determined from historical collection experience and a review of outstanding pledges receivable. Pledges receivable are written off by management when, in their determination, all appropriate collection efforts have been taken.

Investments: The Diocese accounts for investments using Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 124, *Accounting for Certain Investments Held By Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Accordingly, investments are carried at fair value based on quoted market prices and unrealized gains and losses are included in investment income on the statements of activities. Realized gains and losses on sales of investments are computed on a specific identification basis and are recorded on the date of the transaction.

Property and Depreciation: Property, equipment and library books acquired prior to 1950 are stated at independently appraised values. Property and equipment acquired after 1950 are stated at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Subsequent to 1950 several congregation properties have been deeded to the Diocese and these properties are carried based on parochial reports or insurable values at that time. The original basis of plant assets valued at other than cost amounted to \$4,739,631 at December 31, 2008 and 2007. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Expenditures for maintenance and routine repairs are charged to expense as incurred; expenditures for improvements and major repairs that materially extend the useful lives of assets are capitalized.

All the congregations' and the Diocese's investment portfolios are maintained on a pooled "mutual fund" accounting basis with total earnings and investment expenses allocated to each account on a pro-rata basis. Investments restricted to long-term investment consist of permanently restricted investments and temporarily restricted investments for property acquisitions.

Income Taxes: The Diocese is a not-for-profit corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and classified by the Internal Revenue Service as other than a private foundation.

Functional Allocation of Expenses: The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statements of Activities. Accordingly, costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Reclassifications: Certain amounts previously reported in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2007 have been reclassified to conform to the financial statement presentation for the year ended December 31, 2008. These changes had no effect on previously reported net assets or change in net assets.

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**Note 3: Loans Receivable**

The Diocese makes unsecured loans to Churches in Maryland with interest at 4% through its Middendorf Loan Program. The balance of these loans at December 31, 2008 and 2007 was \$2,073,049 and \$2,524,830, respectively. The Diocese also makes other loans at various interest rates ranging from 0% to 5.27% to other organizations totaling \$243,681 and \$383,338 at December 31, 2008 and 2007, respectively, which mature at various dates through June 2016.

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**Note 6: Lines of Credit**

In May 2006, the Diocese obtained a \$3,000,000 and \$700,000 revolving note which accrue interest at the 30 day LIBOR rate plus 0.85% (1.0826% at December 31, 2008). The notes were due and payable on demand. The notes were collateralized by a partial assignment of the unrestricted portion of the Diocese's accounts with PNC Bank. The outstanding balance on these notes was \$1,003,543 at December 31, 2007. In February 2008, the Diocese entered into an agreement with PNC Bank to refinance the remaining \$1,000,000 balance of these outstanding notes at a fixed rate of 5.926%. In July 2008, the PNC Bank note was paid off with the proceeds of a \$1,000,000 note from M & T Bank, the terms of which are stated in Note 7.

In July 2008, the Diocese obtained a \$3,000,000, a \$900,000 and a \$100,000 revolving note from M&T Bank all of which accrue interest at the 30 day LIBOR rate plus 0.85%. Included in the \$900,000 note is a \$200,000 letter of credit. The purpose of these notes is to provide working capital and overdraft protection to the Diocese. The notes are due and payable on demand. The notes are collateralized by the Diocese's securities and commodity accounts held with M&T Bank. The balance on these notes was \$-0- at December 31, 2008.

The Diocese maintained a letter of credit with a bank in the amount of \$102,231 as collateral for the Public Works Agreement. This project was completed during 2008 at which time the letter of credit was closed.

**Note 7: Long-Term Debt**

In July 2008, the Diocese borrowed \$1,000,000 from M&T Bank, the proceeds of which were used to pay off outstanding balance of the PNC Bank note discussed above. The note is collateralized by the Diocese's investment accounts held with M&T Bank and contains certain reporting and financial covenants. The note is being amortized over a 10 year period at a fixed interest rate of 5.41% and is payable in monthly installments of principal and interest totaling \$10,808 and a balloon payment in August 2011. The balance on this note was \$974,931 as of December 31, 2008.

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**Note 10: Retirement Plan**

The Diocese contributes to a Multi-Employer Defined Benefit Plan which is administered by the Church Pension Fund of the National Episcopal Church and covers all salaried employees. The Diocese's policy is to expense amounts required to be funded by the Plan administrator. Pension expense was \$90,479 and \$77,288 in 2008 and 2007, respectively. Information regarding accumulated plan benefits and plan net assets available for benefits relating to the Diocese's employees is not available because the Plan administrator does not provide the information for the Diocese's portion of the Plan.

The Diocese has a Defined Contribution Retirement Plan which covers substantially all employees. Participants must have attained age 21, worked 1,000 hours during the previous year and have 12 months of service at the Diocese. The Diocese contributes 5% of the salary of all participants to the Plan. In addition, the Diocese matches 100% of employee contributions up to 4% of their salaries. Total contributions to the Plans were \$103,473 and \$128,286 for the years ended December 31, 2008 and 2007, respectively.

**Note 11: Operating Leases**

The Diocese leases various equipment under operating leases which expire through 2014. Rent expense for the equipment for the years ended December 31, 2008 and 2007 was \$26,693 and \$28,202, respectively.

**Note 12: Other Matters**

Uninsured Balances: As of December 31, 2008, The Diocese maintained its cash balances in eight financial institutions. These balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to a total of \$250,000 in each institution. Cash balances held by these financial institutions are generally in excess of the federally insured limits. Management does not believe The Diocese is subject to significant credit risk related to cash balances.

Financial Risk: The Diocese's investment portfolio is a professionally managed portfolio that contains common shares and bonds of publicly traded companies, United States Government obligations, and mutual funds. Such investments are exposed to various investment risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with such investments and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of such investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near term could materially affect investment balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements.
